

Motorists' 10 Commandments Are Given Out by Patrol Chief

SACRAMENTO. — Ten "Commandments" for the guidance of California motorists were given today by Eugene Biscailuz, superintendent of the California Highway Patrol, as follows:

- 1.—Give the other fellow the benefit of the doubt. Watchful waiting on the sidewalk is better than in the hospital.
- 2.—Obey traffic rules. Although they often appear to be silly, remember they are the latest result of human wisdom acting upon human experience for the safety of us all.
- 3.—Look! The pedestrian who starts to cross a street, or road without first looking both ways is solely to blame if he is hit by an automobile.
- 4.—Drive discreetly. Let your judgment, rather than impulse, direct your actions, whether on foot or in the motor car.
- 5.—Don't envy the person who passes you on the highway. Forget any feeling of chagrin or mortification when another machine races past or cuts in ahead of you.
- 6.—Never be presumptuous on the highway. The pedestrian has no right to take for granted the highway belongs to him, and the motorist has no right to proceed with too much confidence.
- 7.—Keep your mind on what you're doing. Allow nothing to distract your mind from driving, or from the road ahead.
- 8.—Use your head. Most fatal accidents today are caused because either a motorist or a pedestrian didn't think.
- 9.—Be considerate of your fellow men. The golden rule is the best law of the road.
- 10.—Enjoy life. This is more a matter of character than circumstance. The motorist or pedestrian who rushes in and out, who is always a-twitter with nervousness simply can't get a "kick" out of life.

Chief Engineer Weymouth Selects Safest, Most Economical Colorado Aqueduct Rout

While engineers, city officials and citizens studied with intense interest the Metropolitan Aqueduct report and recommendations recently made by Chief Engineer Frank E. Weymouth, of the Metropolitan Water District, Southern California generally hailed the engineering document as bringing the benefits of Colorado River water one long step closer to the homes of this area.

Following a detailed study of some sixty possible aqueduct routes and a final searching investigation of six of these lines, Weymouth recommended in favor of an aqueduct line with its intake at the Upper Parker dam site on the Colorado River. The Parker intake

would be about 150 miles south of the Hoover dam in Boulder Canyon. Chief Engineer Weymouth stated that he favored the Parker line because:

1. It will deliver water to the Metropolitan District at a lower cost than any other route, all elements of cost considered.
2. It passes over and through geological formations much safer than those encountered by any other route.
3. It will be entirely in California and therefore free of complications and tax burdens encountered by a route passing through another state.

'Ware That Electric Heater as You're 'Singin' in th' Bathtub!

SACRAMENTO.—Have all the fun you want "singin' in the bathtub" but if you value your life, don't touch the curling iron or electric heater!

Such is the warning of Will J. French, director of the California department of industrial relations, who points to the fact that more than 100 deaths have been caused during the last two years from contact with so-called "low voltage" electric current, carrying charges of from 110 to 750 volts.

"There were 56 purely industrial fatalities in the group," said French, "nine mine fatalities and four railroad tragedies. Home fatalities rank second to industry with 31 deaths. Bathtub fatalities led the domestic list with 12 deaths. Next in importance came fatalities from contact while on wet basements or earth, with seven deaths. Portable appliances in the home caused six tragedies. There were several instances where the victims were working under cellar

For a college course in marriage and family guidance, a unique departure in social guidance, is now available to California boys and girls who contemplate matrimony, according to the state department of education.

Study Many Problems
The course has been established by the University of Southern California, under the leadership of Dr. Meyer E. Nimkoff. Some of the subjects include "Preparation for Marriage," open to young men and young women; "Marriage Problems," for husbands and wives; and "Child Guidance," for fathers and mothers.

From courtship to family quarrels, all subjects will be considered. They will include problems of mating, sex adjustments in marriage, problems of reproduction, marriage and money, psychology of the wife who works, religion as a factor in marriage, problems of the first years of marriage, treatment of marital discord, marriage and mental hygiene and success in marriage.
