Missionary to Japan Will Talk At Christian Church Sunday Night

Fred Eugene Hagin, for more than 20 years a missionary to Japan, will occupy the pulpit at the Christian church located on Engracia avenue near Arlington avenue next Sunday night at 7:30 o'clock. Hagin has for years past been regarded as one of the ablest missionaries in Japan. He is reported to know the conditions of which he speaks, and is so qualified to give a discriminating address in which the past achievements of missionary work in the Far East are reviewed.

Hagin contends that Japan is still a most needy field, and gives an earnest and eloquent plea for a more consecrated missionary zeal. While in Japan he was very careful to adjust and keep proper balance among organizations having agents laboring in the Mikado's kingdom.

Hagin will give not merely a missionary recital, but rather it will be a study of almost every feature of Japanese life, presented with a wealth of detail and illustration. He will tell of his personal interview with the Emperor, Marquis Okuma, known generally as Count Okuma, and others.
