The final reading of Ordinance No. 213, "An Ordinance Fixing Rules Regarding Organization of Fire Department in the City of Torrance," was laid over till the next regular meeting.

Trustee Smith reported that the Committee has not been very successful in getting inhalator signals, but last night the whistle signal used for fires in the factory at the Union Tool Company was tried and proved sufficiently loud to warrant a demonstration at the Fire House of a whistle of a similar character.

Attorney Briney stated that there was nothing to report on the water suit until after the two weeks time which was granted the Water Company to consider the offer made by the City February 9th, 1931.

Trustee Nelson reported that the proposition of the city taking out public liability insurance which was deferred for consideration had been investigated, and the Committee prefers to look into other lines before definitely deciding. Also the Committee deemed it expedient for a City of this size to go into, but the investigation has led them to the belief that they desire to inquire from the various insurance companies and other lines and wish to temporarily defer action on the matter.

Trustee Nelson inquired if the City had ever heard from the Pacific Electric Railway Company with reference to the care of emergency cases arising outside the City limits of Torrance where persons are brought into such hospital from County territory for emergency treatment.

Trustee Bell seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

Mr. McCabe from the audience asked if the petition for north Lomita annexation was still alive.

Attorney Briney stated that this could be brought up again by motion of any councilman.

Trustee Smith reported on securing funds for the unemployment situation, stating that Carl Hyde and he had succeeded in securing an allocation of \$15,000.00 from the Board of Supervisors to be used for the employment of labor on various street projects. COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Torrance, California, February 17th, 1931.
MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE.

The regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Torrance, was held in the Council Chamber at Torrance, California, February 17th, 1931, and was called to order at 7:45 p. m., by Mayor Dennis.

The following Trustees were present: Trustees: Bell, Nelson, Steiner, Smith and Dennis.
 Absent: Trustees: None.

Trustee Nelson asked that the following correction be made in the minutes of February 9th, 1931. "After much discussion Trustee Nelson stated that the difference of 1 per cent in the interest rate on the bonds (together with other deductions) would bring the price considerably below \$50,000.00, the saving in interest for a period would be \$58,000."

Trustee Steiner moved that the minutes of the special meeting of February 9th, 1931, after the above correction, and the minutes of the special meeting of February 18th, 1931, all be adopted.

Trustee Bell seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

Clerk Bartlett read a communication from the League of California Municipalities, under date of February 12th, 1931, addressed to the Honorable City Council, asking support of Senate Bill No. 126, a new "regal" law introduced by Senator Harper at request of the League.

Trustee Steiner moved that the City Clerk be instructed to urge our Senator to pass this bill.

Trustee Smith seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

Clerk Bartlett read a communication from the Mayor of the City of Huntington Park, addressed to the Honorable John Dennis, Mayor, under date of February 14th, 1931, inviting the Council to attend a meeting at 6510 Pacific Boulevard, Huntington Park, on February 20th, 1931, for the purpose of forming an association of Mayors and Councilmen of Los Angeles County.

Mayor Dennis stated that the Council that a meeting had been held in Inglewood some time ago for the purpose of perfecting this organization and that this meeting was undoubtedly following up on the original proposal.

It was decided that as many councilmen go, as possible.
