 Gourdi's communication concludes, "and the future possibilities of the two cities, the allotments do not seem consistent and I respectfully request that Torrance's allotment be increased to the present amount of \$125,000. In view of the fact that the lease on the present quarters expires on December 1, 1934, and the crowded condition of our office which is apparent from the drawing I am submitting herewith, I request that, if practicable, you place the appropriation for Torrance on a deficiency bill to become effective before July 1, 1933."

Citizens' Aid Requested
 Gourdi asked for the cooperation of local residents and organizations in trying the increased allotment and the placing of the grant to his city, on a deficiency bill to be acted on by Congress this December. He asked the citizens and organized civic groups in Torrance to write the Inter-Departmental Committee, care of the Supervising Architect, Washington, D. C., and Congressman Joe Cull at once to this effect. Copies of all such letters should be given to the Chamber of Commerce here for filing, so that a complete report can be kept of the campaign.

Water Storage Plan Proposed By County

 Eaton yesterday described the success of a recent spreading process in the Big Dalton wash north of Glendora. The water, 2,000,000 gallons, was released from behind Big Dalton Dam and flowed into a gravel basin, eventually sinking into subterranean storage. After sinking below the surface these waters from the various canyons eventually find their way underground to lands at Whittier, Narrows and near Signal Hill.

Process Described
 Water heretofore escaping through open gates of flood dams will be checked until the barriers are nearly overflowing. It will be held until the crest of the storm is passed and will be released gradually so as to benefit industry and agriculture.

Elementary P. T. A. Learns About Harbor From Talk and Pictures

Lloyd V. Roberts, special representative of the Los Angeles Harbor Department, was the chief speaker at the meeting of the Elementary Parent Teachers association Tuesday afternoon. His talk was illustrated by four reels of pictures showing the industries of the Pacific Southwest as pertaining to import and export through Los Angeles Harbor. Views were shown of the ports of San Pedro, Wilmington and Terminal Island. Other pictures shown were of the dry docks, the outer and inner harbors.

Large ships were shown and the manner in which they are loaded and unloaded. The manner in which different products were prepared for shipping were shown. Cotton from Bakerfield and the Imperial Valley was seen at the compass, where it is made into smaller bales which take up only one-third the room they did in their original bales. This compression not only makes them smaller but reduces the risk of fire as they are less likely to burn.

Oranges were shown from the packing house, where they are washed and selected, until they go into the hold of the vessel over an escalator. About one-half the cotton shipped from Los Angeles Harbor goes to the near east. Old newspapers go to China, where they are made into paper mache or fireworks and returned to this country in these forms.

Mrs. Marie Quisley spoke on Child Welfare work as done by the Woman's club through the Mothers' Educational Center under the direction of Dr. Maud Wilde of Los Angeles. The treasurer's report showed that the Founder's Day offering amounted to \$11.25, which was the largest offering in the tenth district. The money from the paper drive amounted to \$36, it was reported. On April 6 the president's council will meet at the elementary school.

NEW TYPE FORD BODY REPORTED

Numerous body refinements and changes mark the new Ford Model A town sedan, which is now coming off the production line at the Long Beach assembly plant, according to George Peckham, of Schultz, Peckham and Schultz, Ford dealers here.
 No important changes have been made in the mechanical features of the car but the body is entirely new, more comfortable and more beautiful, the local dealer states.

The new body is of all-steel construction while the former one was of wood and steel. The car has a new type flaring windshield, upholstery is of a new and distinct pattern, with narrower piping which will give longer wear, it is said.

A lever action front seat adjustment replaces the turn-screw type and the adjustment is a little more than two inches greater than formerly. There is a new style folding inside sun visor in the front compartment.
Center Arm Removed
 Changes have been made also in the rear section. The center arm in the rear seat has been eliminated. This was done, Peckham stated, because a majority of owners made little or no use of it and its removal permits an unbroken rear backrest, which in neat appearance and additional comfort, more than compensates for the removal of the center arm. The pocket formerly in the door panel has been moved to the rear of the front seat.


