Health Inspectors Get First Aid Kits

Prepared to render emergency service to the injured on the county's highways, 60 county health inspectors were equipped this week with complete automobile first aid kits following their graduation from a 24-hour course in first aid training given by the American Red Cross, according to an announcement of county health authorities.

The training and equipping in first aid of field workers of the county health department followed an order of the Board of Supervisors when it was shown by vital statistics that deaths and injuries due to automobile accidents are becoming major public health problems. Dr. J. L. Pomeroy, county health officer, pointed out that health inspectors frequently come upon accidents in various sections of the county and that proper care in the first few moments following injury is the most important factor in recovery.


