

## Bathers Urged To Use Discretion in Ocean First Time

Bathers at the county beaches have been cautioned by the county life guard service, not to over-estimate their prowess or skill in the surf at this season of the year. The fact that an unusually large number of rescues have been made during the past ten days at the various beaches does not necessarily indicate that the surf is particularly hazardous at this time. Chief Life Guard Edgar Carroll points out:

"Many bathers influenced by the warm spring weather, forget that it is yet early spring and that the surf is yet very cold. On the other hand it is the time of the equinox which always causes new cross currents and the surf to act up in general. The consequence is, that it is not a difficult matter for a bather to get in trouble if he does not exercise a certain amount of caution."

## OLDEST FORD DRIVER



J. M. Crow, 89, of Ethel, Miss., the oldest Ford driver in Mississippi, traversed the historic old Natchez Trace in a covered wagon eighty-seven years ago.

As rugged today at 89 as the age in American history he so pleasantly typifies, J. M. Crow of Ethel, Miss., is the oldest Ford driver in Mississippi and one of the oldest in the United States.

When as a babe of two years he rode with his parents in one of a train of 30 covered wagons out of Cobb county, Georgia, into Mississippi, the old Natchez Trace was still infested by the swashbuckling ruffians whose bloody outrages gave that era its place in this country's history as "the outlaw years."

One of his vivid memories is hearing, as a boy of six, the news of General Scott's victorious assault on the heights of Chapultepec which ended the Mexican War in 1847, and his proudest memory is of honorable service as a Confederate soldier during the Civil War. When the southern cause collapsed, Crow was compelled to trudge 400 miles on foot to the old homestead at Ethel where he settled down to rear a family.

In the intervening years he has seen the lumbering stagecoach give way to the fleet automobile and the comfortable motorbus, the soggy gumbo and rough corduroy roads of his childhood to the wide, paved roads of today, and although he was long past middle age before the modern automobile became commonplace he is as enthusiastic a driver as youngsters who can boast less than one-quarter of his years.

Five generations of Crow's family are frequently seen together in his Model A Ford, the second of its type Crow has owned and driven.

## Local Mexican Killed in Gun Fight Monday

Two Mexicans are being sought by deputy sheriffs for the murder of Juan Carrasco, 28, said to be a Torrance rancher, who was found near the corner of Bonita and Carson streets, three miles north of Wilmington, Monday night with two bullets in his body.

Nothing could be learned concerning Carrasco's residence here, deputy sheriffs reporting that all they knew was to the effect that he was a rancher in this city. That the Mexican, armed only with a belt knife, sought futilely to defend himself against the assassins' bullets was indicated by the circumstances surrounding the murder, deputies stated.

Carrasco told friends early Monday evening that he was "going out to have a fight." Residents near the scene of the shooting reported they heard five shots altogether. Both the victim's and the murderers' cars were found at the scene, it is reported.

## New Street Names Before L. A. Council

A petition from the Street Naming Committee of the Association of City Planners, requesting the renaming of the portion of the route now known as Weston street, Wilmington Salt Works road, "S" street and Reyes street to Lomita boulevard, lying within the city of Los Angeles, was referred by the council of that city this week to the city engineer and the City Planning Committee.

A second petition from the Street Naming Committee calling attention of the Los Angeles council to the fact that the city of Torrance has officially changed the name of the route previously known as El Prado and Redondo boulevard to Torrance boulevard was referred to the same parties.

## "Far Speaker Book" Goes to Press Next Friday, Smith Says

If Torrance subscribers called it by its Berlin name they would find their names and telephone numbers in the "Far Speaker Book" (Fernsprechbuch). Fred W. Smith, district manager of the Southern California Telephone Company, said today in announcing that the new issue of the Torrance directory will go to press on Friday, April 10. All changes and additions of new names must be made before 5 p. m. of that day.

Other exotic terms for telephone directory which the company has gathered from all parts of the world were also mentioned by Smith. In Holland it is "Naamslijst voor den telefoondienst" (name list for the telephone service). Paris calls it the "Official Annual of Telephone Subscribers." Transvaal of South Africa, likes the sound of "Telefon Adressboek" (Telephone Addressbook) for its Dutch people. Copenhagen's choice is shorter, "Telefon Navnebog" (Telephone Namebook). Porto Rico says "Guia Telefonica" or Telephone Guide.

Approximately 15,500 copies of the new issue will be printed and will be delivered in Torrance, San Pedro, Wilmington, Avalon, and Lomita about May 1.

## Lassco Announces Low-Fare Easter Excursion Rates

Special low-fare Easter-time excursions from Los Angeles, San Pedro, Wilmington or Long Beach to San Francisco and return were announced by the Los Angeles Steamship Company for the sailing of the LASSCO coastwise liner Harvard from Wilmington Thursday, April 2, and the Yale, Friday, April 3.

A minimum rate of \$10 for the round trip, including meals and berth, will be in effect for the two special sailings, each of which will have a six-day return limit. Approximately one-third of the total passenger capacity of each ship will be available at the unusually low minimum round trip rate. Outside rooms will be two dollars more, while deluxe accommodations may be secured at a slightly higher rate.

The rate will also be extended to San Diego so that residents of the Southern city may make the round trip to San Francisco under identical conditions as those enjoyed by people in the Los Angeles area for rates ranging from a minimum of \$13. Similar excursions will also be in effect from San Francisco for the sailing of the Yale from the northern port Wednesday, April 1, and the Harvard, Friday, April 3.
