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Torrance Resident, Graduate Of Heidelberg University, Offers Services Free to Community

Behind the name "Olinger and Davis—Electrical Engineering and Contracting" lies a story of a young Belgian, who in the midst of the World War was perfecting himself at the University of Heidelberg for his work today for the United States Government.

A. P. Olinger, of 1315 Anapola avenue, is that young Belgian. His partner, George Davis, is the man in charge of the firm's construction work. They recently completed the electrical installation on the new General Petroleum service station at the corner of Sartori and Post avenues.

They are now at work on a \$15,000 contract for the government at March Field, near Riverdale, and at the North Island, San Diego, Marine headquarters, and the Naval Training station in the southern city.

Olinger, a native of Liege, Belgium, was unable to complete the education he had planned to pursue in his own country because of the invasion of the leading educational institutions by German troops. Although he was, naturally, antagonistic towards the German war lords, Olinger went to Heidelberg and there from 1915 to 1919, when he graduated.

Offers Services to City

At the conclusion of his schooling, Olinger journeyed across Germany, escorted by two soldiers, en route to his home. After a year, he came to this country. Although he could speak Flemish, French, German and Italian, he knew nothing of English.

Today, Olinger, a world traveler—he toured the Belgian Congo during vacation periods at school—is a master electrician and a public-spirited resident of Torrance.

"I offer my services to the city at any time as a consulting engineer on any electrical problem they may wish to consider without charge. I believe in being of assistance to one's own community and if I can help Torrance become a better place in which to live—my services are at call," he said yesterday.

Olinger has an interesting story of life in the world-famous German university at Bingen; of experiences as a student in the electrical corps; of his travels in Africa, and of his amusing adventures in coming to the United States and seeing the country without knowledge of the language. The Herald plans to present some of the experiences of this Torrance citizen in the near future.

in which the Hyatts were riding and the death toll of two victims. The accident occurred at 12:55 a. m., it was reported.

After the impact, the truck spun around and turning in the opposite direction to which it was headed, smashed against a telephone pole on the southwest side of the crossing. The Ford was pinned underneath the wheels of the trailer and a powerful jack had to be used to release the victims in the sedan.

Inquest is Planned

Bockman's statement to police was that he was driving at a respectable rate of speed, had slowed down for the boulevard stop on 190th street and that he did not see the Ford until it was right before him. The driver reported, according to police, that the Ford was traveling at a high rate of speed. The inquest has been employed for the past two years as a truck driver by the Pittilli Brothers of Paente.

At noon today, no statement had yet been taken from Hyatt at the local hospital. Hyatt has been comatose for several years at the Columbus street mill. The inquest will be held at 9:30 Saturday morning at Stone and Myers, where the bodies of Mrs. Hyatt and her son are held. No arrangements have been made as yet for the funeral services.
