La Fiesta de Los Angeles to Be Celebrated September 4 to 12

Plans of time will be turned backward in effect at least, when Los Angeles holds its 150th birthday celebration September 4 to 12, as part of California's statewide Fiesta program for 1931. And coupled with the program of decidedly modern Mexico held successive sways over California territory, is an ambitious plan to re-create that romantically historical period when Spain and Mexico held successive sways over California territory, is an ambitious program of decidedly modern events, fully occupying the entire nine days, which have been set aside for "La Fiesta de Los Angeles."

Such, in brief, was the announcement issued this week by a committee of 800 citizens, headed by John G. Mott, concerning the birthday observance, which Los Angeles is planning. Listed among the special events are a rodeo, an aviation fiesta, a night motion picture industry procession on downtown streets, an evening of fiesta music in Hollywood bowl, street dancing, special neighborhood celebrations, fireworks, a marine spectacle and other modern touches.

Contrasting with these 20th century events, there will be a street parade harking back to the days of the Spaniard, with steeds greatly outnumbering the motor vehicles, an observance of the arrival of the railroad, a celebration at Los Angeles harbor to denote the struggle by which it was obtained, and a re-enactment of the founding of the city.

Poppy Day to Be Observed May 23

Thousands of red Memorial Poppies are being made in the seven government hospitals in California by disabled veterans for the annual sale on Poppy Day, May 23, by the units of the American Legion Auxiliary. Poppy Day is nationwide in scope and the replica of the little wild flower that grows in the fields of Flanders and France is sold in every community on the Saturday before Memorial Day.

The purpose of the Poppy sale is two-fold. First, to honor the war dead by wearing the flower which grows on the fields where the American soldiers answered the living victims of the war, the disabled veterans, their families and the families of the dead.

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
