AMENDMENT NOW BEFORE UPPER GROUP

Another week's siege in the Senate committee hearing on the amendment to the Fish and Game laws of the state which vitally affect the Salm Manufacturing Company, makers of commercial abalone shell ornaments, was predicted by Carl Hyde in a telegram yesterday to W. Rufus Page, of the Chamber of Commerce. Hyde is lending the opposition to the measure all the support he can.

The chamber's secretary also informed Page that the park bill, affecting Alondra Park and allowing state aid for such recreational centers, passed the house yesterday and that no senate opposition was expected.

John Salm, president of the distinctive California industry located here, has just returned from a six weeks business trip back east. On account of the influx of orders at the local plant he was forced to cut his trip short about two weeks. Salm reports that business conditions in the extreme east were considerably on the up-grade and he was enthusiastic over the prospect being made by his plant. The local concern is running near capacity but has a large stock on hand to meet the orders, he said.

Harbor Movies Are Viewed By New Club Here

Views of the Los Angeles harbor, with all its miles of docks, vast warehouses and shipping of all kinds, were shown as a motion picture at the dinner meeting of the National Business and Professional Women of Torrance Tuesday evening.

The motion picture was sponsored by the harbor division of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce and seen in detail with an accompanying explanation of the scenes of industry. It represented 35 minutes of extremely interesting material.

Mrs. A. E. Finator, dramatic soprano of Hermosa Beach, accompanied by Mrs. Kathryn Johnston, sang three delightful numbers. Community singing and the reading of the club collect rounded out the program.

At the next meeting on May 4, officers are to be elected for the new fiscal year. All members are expected to make an effort to attend this meeting.

Report Made On City Water Suit

The city's special counsel in the prosecution of the water suit to determine the legality of the \$100,000 bond issue to create a publicly-owned water system has been requested by the Appellate Court to show the necessity for that court's action in the matter. City Engineer Frank R. Leonard reported to the council Tuesday night.

No definite time was set as to the city's attorney's reply to the court's request, the engineer said. This means that the court must decide whether or not it will take action in the controversy. If the Appellate Court refuses, then the city's case will be presented in the State Supreme Court. Leonard said he was informed by James L. Beebe, member of the firm engaged by the city to prosecute the case.

FIRE CHIEF ISSUES HIS ANNUAL FIRE WARNING

Fire Chief Ben Hannebrink issued his annual warning on the subject of fire prevention this week. He said that the city ordinance expressly prohibits any open fires between 10 a. m. and 4:30 p. m., and that it is contrary to law for anyone to leave a fire unattended.

Cycle of Light Rainfall Years Is Now at End

County and City Executives Meet Tonight to Talk Water Supply

That the cycle of light rainfall years which has persisted in Southern California for approximately a decade nears an end is a belief expressed yesterday by W. S. Rosecrans, president of the Conservation Association of Los Angeles County. The current season's precipitation is far below normal, however, the conservation official declares.

Mr. Rosecrans made this statement in connection with an announcement that municipal county and state officials interested in Southern California's water supply will assemble for a dinner meeting at the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce tonight April 23, at 8:30 p. m., to discuss the current serious water supply situation.

Mayor Porter, members of the Board of Supervisors and the City Council, as well as officials from all communities of the County have been invited to be present.

Police Nab Couple For Thefts Here

ing, household linen, window curtains and furniture were recovered by police with the exception of a few inexpensive things, it was reported.

The arrest and conviction of the pair was the result of their last clothes-line stripping foray, which occurred, according to police, last Sunday-night at the home of Mrs. R. D. Haley, at 1515 Beech street. Mrs. Haley discovered the theft shortly after the Cullens had taken a quantity of wet clothing from the drying line. The police were notified and they found tracks leading across the alley to the Cullen residence on Cedar avenue.

Search Warrant Used

But when Mrs. Cullen was interviewed that same night she denied having anything to do with the theft, the night officers reported. Because the tracks were so plain, the wet clothing having been placed in a basket and dragged over the intervening distance, Police Chief Calder advised Mrs. Haley to swear out a search warrant for an inspection of the suspects' home. This was done Monday morning and the stolen articles found together with the plunder accumulated by the Cullens in their previous thefts, Calder declared.

Mrs. Haley recovered most of the clothing, valued at about \$45. Confronted with the evidence of the Haley theft, Mrs. Cullen broke down and admitted the other robberies, police said.

Robbed Vacant House

These were: (1) Clothing taken from a drying line in the rear of the residence occupied by Andrew J. Harder at 1604 Greenwood street. This occurred about 10 days ago. The articles were valued at about \$25. (2) A house-breaking at 2818 Torrance (Redondo) boulevard, where approximately \$50 worth of household equipment was taken from an empty furnished house owned by Orin Thompson, of 2876 Torrance boulevard; and (3) the theft of the 24 leaves of bread, of which police recovered 12 in the Cullens' home.

Mrs. Cullen was immediately placed under arrest Monday morning, but Cullen was not apprehended until he returned from working on a special county job for unemployed men near San Pedro. Cullen had just started to work that morning. They were charged jointly with petty theft and burglary.
