Coroner's Jury Blames Victim For Bad Crash

One man was almost instantly killed, another critically injured and five other persons, all members of the same family, were seriously hurt in a terrific head-on crash near the intersection of 100th street and Harbor boulevard Sunday night. Wallace A. Hall, 32, a transport pilot living in Compton, was the victim and, according to a verdict of the coroner's jury sitting at the inquest here yesterday morning, was held negligent and the cause of the accident.

George Calvin Harmon, Julian City, a passenger in the car driven by Hall, is reported badly injured at a Compton hospital. He is suffering from a fractured skull, concussion of the brain and other injuries.

How It Happened At the inquest, held at Stone and Myers, it was brought out that Hall met his death when the machine he was driving skidded in attempting to pass two cars abreast, swerved to the wrong side of the road and collided with a terrific force into a car driven in the opposite direction by H. L. Voien, 42, of Los Angeles. Both cars were almost demolished.

Funeral services for Hall were held yesterday at Stone and Myers with Rev. Ben Lingenfelter officiating. Cremation followed at Pacific Crest. Hall's mother, who came here from Sacramento on word of her son's death, was in attendance at the services.

Deputy sheriffs held Judd Hallberg, 25, Huntington Park, on a charge of drunken driving coincident with the accident. Officers claimed that at the time of the crash, their investigation of the scene of the fatal crash indicated that Hallberg and Hall, both of whom were en route from the Compton airport in their cars, were racing just before the accident.

However, Hallberg testified that he did not know it was Hall's machine which struck his car. Hall passed him—the impact causing Hall's car to skid on the wet pavement.
