Destructive Mood Lands Man in Jail

LOMITA.—Last Thursday afternoon Herford Greenman was in a very destructive mood. He was also very drunk. Breaking into the house of Mrs. L. A. Fuller at 1321 Narbonne, he proceeded to break glass, tear clothes, and smash up things generally. Mrs. Fuller was not at home but the disturbance aroused neighbors who telephoned for the police. In the meantime Harold Grant took a hand in the matter and forced Greenman out of the house. Officers found him in a loud and fighting mood so took him to the Torrance jail, where he proceeded to smash a chair and a window. Locked in a cell he was forced to consider it a day.

Friday he was taken before Judge Dennis who fined him \$200 or 90 days in the county jail for the \$500 or 180 days for damaging property and 180 days for being drunk.

The first two sentences were suspended and 150 days on the third charge on condition that after serving 30 days in the county jail he leave Los Angeles county for a year. He was committed to the county jail.
