### CASSEROLE COOKERY

Now that the days are longer and warmer, why not enjoy out-of-doors that extra hour before dinner? The casserole will add you to do so because from it you may serve a complete meal for which you made all the preparations in the morning. With the addition of a crisp salad and a light, cool dessert, you will have rounded out a well balanced menu. As the main dish, in casserole, I would suggest you try the recipe given below. You will find it both filling and exceptionally good.

### ITALIAN DELIGHT

1 lb. round steak and ½ lb. pork steak ground together.  
1 Onion.  
½ lb. grated cheese.  
1 can shoe peg corn.  
1 can tomato soup.  
1 pkg. wide noodles.  
Brown the onion in a frying pan. Add the meat and fry until the redness disappears. All the can of corn, can of tomato soup, and can of tomato paste, and can of tomato paste. Cook the package of wide noodles. Now put alternate layers of, noodles and meat mixture in casserole, sprinkling each layer with grated cheese, saving some for the top. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, for ½ hour. This serves eight. This is also excellent warmed over, or

it may be used for stuffing peppers.
