**SATURDAY IS
"POPPY DAY"
IN TORRANCE**

More than 250,000 red memorial poppies are expected to be sold throughout California Poppy Day, next Saturday, May 23, by the 20,000 members of the American Legion Auxiliary. The 300 units of the organization in this state are amply supplied with the little red flower which holds such memories for those who fought on the battle fields of France, and plan larger sales this year than ever before. The local Auxiliary will conduct an all-day sale of the memorial flowers in Torrance.

"The little white label attached to each of the memorial poppies will sell on the streets May 23 is the public's protection," Mrs. Ethel Flynn, secretary of the organization, said this week. "The label, which is secured to the stem of every poppy, bears on one side the words 'In Memoriam,' and the official emblem of the Legion and the American Legion Auxiliary. On the other side it carries the names of the two organizations and the words 'Veteran Made Poppy.'"

No poppy which does not bear this label is the official poppy of the Auxiliary. The label gives assurance that the vast organization of the Legion and Auxiliary stands behind the poppy, vouches that the flower is veteran-made and pledges that the best possible use will be made of the money paid for the flower. As a further protection for the public, all women selling the Legion and Auxiliary poppy will wear distinctive badges with the Auxiliary's name in large letters.

C-C. M. O. Well Near Ventura Down 10,000 Feet; World Record

Climaxing an effort which began in August, 1929, the Chancellor-Canfield Midway Oil Company's Hobson A-2 well, southeast of the Sealiff oil field in Ventura county, has attained a depth of 10,000 feet to reach into the earth that far in search of commercial oil production. It was reported late last week.

With a minimum of delay resulting from fishing jobs and other mechanical difficulties, which included the burning of the derrick when the product once blew out, Hobson A-2 is thought to be in excellent condition for oil production in case it has sufficient oil sand and enough gas pressure to lift oil nearly two miles. Chancellor-Canfield, which operates a large field here, was the first operator in the state to drill a hole more than 8000 feet deep. It is reported.

Residents Donate \$500 in Foodstuffs Friday



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
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
