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

Increase in Neighborliness Is Said Contribution of City Park To Happiness of All Residents

Happiness, peace and comfort, to a large degree, depend upon the neighborliness experienced by an individual or family in the city where they live. That fine quality of civic friendliness can be increased in Torrance by the creation of a modern, well-equipped park and children's playgrounds.

The following article, taken from "A Manual of Municipal and County Parks," compiled as a result of a country-wide survey by the Playground and Recreation Association of America, shows how neighborliness will thrive and flourish in a community fortunate to have recreational centers for men, women and children.

Parks Increase Neighborliness

"For nearly 200 years America may be said to have been comprised largely of communities of neighbors. Up to 1880 over 20 per cent of the people lived in rural communities, where they were drawn together not only by their natural instincts for companionship but by their dependence on each other in carrying on their daily lives. They lived together each other in clearing the land; in erecting their homes; in planting and in harvest. They fished and hunted and played together. With the invention and perfection of machine tools, making it unnecessary for people to live so largely on one another, neighborliness began to decline; quilting parties went out of fashion; spinning bees were no longer the occasion of gatherings of the household; the harvesting of hay and wheat, always a cooperative undertaking, began to be done by different types of machines; community recreations were largely destroyed; old folk dances and dancing parties gave way to modern dancing and commercial dance halls; always a fashionable home parties and community picnics began to disappear. To crown all these social disintegrating forces the lines of social contact were broken everywhere throughout rural America by migrations of large numbers of the people, especially the younger people, to the places where machines and capital were being amassed.

Restoring Friendliness

"The inevitable result of the present-day system of working and living, making as it does for individualism, has been a distinct loss in the old spirit of neighborliness and cooperation. Out of the leisure of the people comes the only hope for them to build a community life in which neighborliness will thrive.

"It itself is not enough. There must be numerous opportunities for people to use this leisure in a way which will promote mutual acquaintance, friendship and good will, through all manner of activities which they enjoy together. The facilities and leadership furnished by park authorities which bring people together in their leisure time are steps in the direction of providing opportunity for people to create communities in which the spirit of neighborliness will flourish.

"It is not too much to say that park and recreation planners and executives and the citizens who are giving thought to the recreational needs of the people are perhaps the chief agents in restoring to modern American community life the spirit which made earlier life in American wholesome and desirable."
