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Mountains Call at L. A. Camps



Summer time is vacation time at Los Angeles municipal mountain camps, Seelye, Radford, and High Sierra, where families may enjoy the "great outdoors" at inexpensive city rates as guests of the Los Angeles Playground and Recreation Department.

With summer vacation time almost at hand and thousands of families planning their outings for the season, preparations are under way at the Los Angeles municipal camps for the many visitors that annually seek these cool mountain playgrounds for a period of rest and recreation.

As has been the custom in the past, Camp Seelye will be the first of the three mountain playgrounds to begin its summer outing season, opening on June 7. This camp is located in the Lake Arrowhead region of the San Bernardino mountains in the heart of one of the most popular vacation areas in Southern California.

Camp Radford, another San Bernardino mountain recreation center, is to open on June 14. Radford is in a more isolated and rugged region of the mountain range, across a high ridge from Big Bear Lake. Vacationists at this playground may either enjoy the recreations offered in the camp itself or spend their time in hiking, horseback riding, or fishing in the untrammeled back country.

Camp High Sierra, in the heart of the California High Sierras, will begin its summer schedule on June 21. This playground, situated in the center of the state's most magnificent mountain region, provides a headquarters for vacationists to spend their outings amid the giant peaks, glaciers, forests, and numberless lakes of those "California Alps."

Both Camp Radford and Camp Seelye are equipped with rustic cabins, community dining hall, recreational lodge, swimming pool, children's playground, and facilities for tennis, archery, and other sports. Camp High Sierra has practically the same attractions, with the exception of a swimming pool.

Nominal rates in effect at all Los Angeles municipal camps make it possible for vacationists to spend their outings at these playgrounds at a cost frequently less than their budgets at home. The reason for the lowness of camp fees is the fact that the playground and Recreation Department operates all three centers on a cost basis.

Drain the cases and fry in deep fat until golden brown; or they may be toasted in the oven. Fill with any desired cream mixture, adding color to the filling with the use of pigment and chopped parsley.
