Dennis Is Adverse To Being "Gypped"

Declaring that he "refused to let the city be gypped," Mayor John Dennis joined with the other members of the council Monday night in rejecting a compromise settlement with a steel company (not local) that attempted to collect a bill for steel at \$1.25 a pound.

The metal was ordered for use on city Fresno piers to replace steel formerly purchased at \$1.20 or 25 cents a pound. When the steel arrived it was refused at the railroad depot and the company has been trying ever since February 4 to collect the full amount of \$182.

Law enforcing agencies of the State and National Government have joined forces in a vigorous drive to end a "whispering" campaign of innuendo against financial institutions and intended, say the authorities, ultimately to destroy the National Government itself.

The services of the American Legion have been tendered the authorities and have been accepted. Attorney General U. S. Webb and the U. S. Attorneys for Northern and Southern California call upon citizens generally to co-operate against the "common enemy."

Offenders, guilty of spreading the malicious propaganda, may be prosecuted under Section 6 of the Civil Rights Code which provides a maximum sentence of 10 years imprisonment and a fine of \$5000.
