

City Jail Hangs Out S. R. O. Sign Over Week-End

For the first time in recent months the city jail was crowded to capacity Saturday night when nine men were incarcerated on drunk and disturbing the peace charges. One Mexican woman was also held in the women's quarters of the jail.

Four of the men were arrested in Torrance, the remaining five being brought here by Constable Tabors and Sheriff Sergeant John Stroth from Lomita. David Walsh, 31, was fined \$25 or 25 days in jail for being intoxicated and causing a disturbance at a local cafe Friday evening.

Five in Lomita Brawl

The intersection of Amapola and Maricopa avenues was a "hot spot" Saturday night when four Mexicans indulged in what police reported a drunken battle-royal. Three of the combatants, including Mrs. Francisca Martinez, 31, were fined \$25 or 25 days in jail on charges of intoxication and disturbing the peace. They were Cecil Martinez, 19; Juan Rosalio, 27; and Mrs. Martinez, Juan Romero, 26, was also arrested and was fined \$25 on a prior charge.

A drinking party which ended in a fight resulted in the arrest of five men at 1424 Pennsylvania avenue. Arraigned before Judge Dennis Monday afternoon the five pleaded guilty and were fined \$25 or 25 days each, \$20 or 5 days being suspended in each case. The men gave the names of George C. Baker, alias Claude Laughlin; Frank Wingate, George Thurman, Jimmy Ferguson and Tommy McLaren. All said they were from San Pedro. Baker also pleaded guilty to possession and was fined \$50, sentence being suspended for one year.

Temporary Ball Park Progresses

Telephone Company Helps By Removing Pole

A letter of appreciation was sent by the Chamber of Commerce this week to the Southern California Telephone Company for the removal without cost to the city of the telephone pole now in the center of the temporary baseball diamond which is under construction at Border avenue and Carson street. The removal of the pole was estimated to cost about \$200, but the telephone company reported to the chamber that they would take it out and erect two higher ones on either side of the field without charge.

The higher poles will eliminate any hazard on the ball field, it is reported. A large wire screen behind the home-plate will be erected by the league players to be paid from receipts donated by fans during the course of the night ball season. Bids on a flood lighting system for night play are being received by those in charge of the construction of the park. Plans for illuminating the field have been drawn and are in the hands of contractors who wish to bid on the equipment.

This lighting equipment will be moved to the permanent baseball field at the Torrance Municipal Park in event the park-playground bonds carry next Tuesday.
