State Okays Newspaper Advertising

SACRAMENTO.—The State of California believes in newspaper advertising. Authority for this statement is none other than Roland A. Vandegrift, director of the state department of finance, who says that the budget allowance for advertising the California State Fair this year has been doubled. "We feel the California press is the most effective means of reaching the public," said Vandegrift. The advertising allocation will again be handled by the California Newspaper Publishers' Association, of which the Torrance Herald is a member. The state has permanently discontinued roadside billboard advertising.
