Mayor Platt gained a barrier at the Pacific Grove bathhouse, her contention being that the owner of the property had no right to deny the public access to the ocean beach.

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USING US FOR AN EXAMPLE

Editor Louis Mohar of the Redondo Reflex uses the city of Torrance as an example in the following editorial, published June 5, which urges Redondo citizens to wake up to the advantages of a charter-city form of government:

WE MUST WAKE UP

"Torrance has made all the necessary preparations for holding an election on June 9 to create a freeholders' board that will draft a city charter.

"Will Redondo Beach again sit back and watch this neighbor city do the things which every live city is doing? Will we sit back and watch only, never learning anything, never following a good example?"

"We were sound asleep a few years ago when Torrance annexed territory through to the ocean—territory which, by every principle of municipal expansion, belonged to Redondo Beach!

"Now with half as many people as live in Redondo Beach, the city of Torrance moves forward in the direction of the larger powers and larger opportunities of a municipality under a charter.

"One of the several diabolical things perpetrated by the state legislature, many years ago, was the passing of the laws which created the sixth-class cities. Any town living in that class is hamstrung and shackled. Redondo Beach outlived the sixth-class status years ago. Candidates have pledged themselves to work for the charter; the same candidates when elected have failed to do anything. Why? This town slumbers and sleeps in the swaddling clothes of A. D. 1900.

"One year ago Mrs. Hopkins, then mayor, brought up the charter proposition; she reminded the council of its pledges and its duties. There was plenty of time then, had action been taken, to elect the freeholders, draft the charter and have it approved before the legislature adjourned. NOTHING WAS DONE.

"Now Torrance, wide awake, up and coming, in the midst of business depression, is going after a charter. She will get it. She will get other good things.

"Every one in Redondo Beach, who has taken the trouble to use his head for a few minutes on the subject of municipal difficulties, is convinced that virtually all the troubles connected with the city council and the factions are the direct outcome of the crazy law under which a sixth-class city must function. Such a city has no real mayor's office. Whoever the individual may be in that office, he is forced to work for the city for love and fake abuse for the shortcomings of the law, not his own shortcomings. A sixth-class city has no head, no concentration of effort, no central power, no real organization, no authority to obtain or use professional ability combined with authority.

"It is too ridiculous for description that a city like Redondo Beach, with its incomparable resources, excellent location and fine climate, should struggle along under the burden of the sixth-class status when there is so simple and easy a method for reorganizing under a charter.

"We hope that the good example of Torrance will stimulate Redondo Beach and that we may proceed without delay to elect freeholders and get our charter drawn up."

SUMMER LUNCHEON DISH

This Jellied Meat Loaf, given below, is an ideal luncheon dish for a hot summer day. Potato chips, combination vegetable salad, leaf tea and a good dessert round out a most delightful and cooling menu. By the way, you might be interested to know this Jellied Meat Loaf has been served to a President's wife.

Jellied Meat Loaf
2 lbs. beef
1/2 lb. pork
12 eggs, hard-cooked
3 tablespoons granulated gelatin
2 cups or more broth
2 cans pimientos

Cook meat until tender, grind and mix with a little stock. Season with salt and pepper and onion juice to taste. Mix boiling stock, at least 2 cups, with 3 tablespoons granulated gelatin. Mix meat with quarter of the gelatin liquid and pour into bread pan and allow to set. When firm, pour remaining quarter of the gelatin liquid mixed with the egg yolks which have been chopped fine and seasoned. When firm add a layer of the egg whites prepared in the same way; and following that a layer of the pimiento, chopped fine and mixed with the remaining quarter of the gelatin liquid. This makes a very attractive meat loaf with its layers of meat, yellow, white and red.
