Registration of graduates will start at the "High school" at 10 o'clock next Monday morning under the direction of Kathryn Wheaton, registration chairman. Between the time of registration and luncheon at the school cafeteria at noon, the alumni will visit their old class rooms and former teachers. A pep rally, and entertainment is scheduled at 1:15 o'clock at the auditorium, from where the graduates will go in a body to the annual Alumni-Varsity baseball game at 2:30.

A dinner-dance, entertainment, reunion and election of officers will begin at 7 o'clock at the school cafeteria. Present officers of the association are Mrs. Vonderhug, president; Orville Hudson, '29, vice president; Edith Harshman, '27, secretary; and Carl Burmaster, '25, treasurer.

Bringing to the screen a picture packed with laughter, love interest and droll situations, Mary Pickford's latest United Artists feature comes to the Torrance Theater Sunday and Monday.

"Kiki" was an international stage success and Miss Pickford has given to the role her own personality in a madcap characterization of the type that first brought her fame.
