**Council, Chamber Acknowledges
Appreciation to Large Delegation**

The following statement was issued by Mayor John Dennis, representing the City Council, and W. Rufus Page, president of the Chamber of Commerce, in recognition of the fine response to requests for attendance at the hearing on the Torrance Health and Welfare Center yesterday morning at the Board of Supervisors' chambers:

"Fellow Citizens:
"The response to the call for a public delegation to attend a meeting of the Board of Supervisors Wednesday morning, in the interest of the pro-

posed county health and welfare project here by such a splendid, wholesome body of citizens, both men and women, was indeed most gratifying to the city of Torrance and its Chamber of Commerce. We are sure that those who attended this hearing are also grateful for their having done so because it could not help but impress those present with the necessity of having a coordinated community interest on matters of this kind where our different agencies of government are involved.

"It is felt certain that the Torrance delegation impressed the Supervisors most favorably, and while a great deal of energy has been expended by the representatives of the city from its administrative agency and the chamber, it is fair to assume that if success is attained at this time, owing to the extreme economic conditions, it will be due to the public interest which so many fine people of Torrance gave toward the project at this public hearing.

Impressed With
Center Project**

graphic center of a large radius that takes in Gardena, Moneta, Lawndale, El Nido, Hermosa, Redondo, Palms Verdes, Harbor City, Lomita and other unincorporated territory of Torrance is favorably situated with respect to rail, bus and highway facilities, Page recounted. The drainage and topographical qualities of the site for the county buildings cannot be surpassed, he declared.

That the Torrance Health and Welfare Memorial hospital, an institution of recognized high standing, is within a few blocks of the proposed county site should prove a boon in the future to the county was another of Page's qualifications for the Center. The nearness of the site to schools and industries was one of the speaker's concluding reasons.

In Industrial Center. Councilman R. R. Smith carried on the city's presentation with a fact-presenting talk on the relationship of this community's industrial formation to the proposed Health and Welfare Center. Quoting the County Charities department as stating that Torrance was one of the few communities in the county which had shown ability to provide organized benefit for its needy, Smith drew a picture of the relationship of the average industrial worker as a citizen and his requirements for such a combined health and welfare unit.

"It would be impossible for the county, according to the councilman's words, to locate a center such as has been proposed by the county in any more central industrial area than Torrance. In closing, Smith stressed the possibility of high efficiency should the Supervisors provide organized benefit here where it would serve the most at the least expense to both county government and individual budgets.

Moral Obligation
Carrying the picture of county expenditures in Torrance into the future, Judge C. F. Rippey in his discussion of the matter from an economic and taxation standpoint, described the relatively minor requests that have been made in the past and the little opportunity Torrance would have in the future to ask the county for aid. The speaker presented some striking complications showing the sizable levies this city has contributed to the county in the form of county taxes. "In contrast Rippey reported the modest county expenditures within this city during the 10 years of its incorporated existence.

Stressing the moral obligation faced by the county to erect a Health and Welfare Center here, Rippey told the Supervisors that the city was encouraged nearly

three years ago to buy the site now offered and arrange it for dedication to the county. This offer, he said, represented a substantial payment of principal and interest in anticipation of the county fulfilling its part of the bargain.

Quinn's Pledge
Then the speaker proposed that the county increase the appropriation to \$70,000 in order to provide for the inclusion of the Lomita township justice court and constable's offices. He declared this would be a move in the path of economy set by the Supervisors as it would eliminate the monthly rentals now being paid for such quarters.

Rippey's talk concluded the city's presentation of its case. Then Supervisor Quinn addressed the assembled Torrance delegation and the board. He declared that he was fully cognizant that the large group present from this city was representative of the community. This delegation, he said, was not indicative of a minority verbal effort but a thoroughly community-wide appeal. After paying tribute to the memory of former Supervisor McClellan, Quinn stated that that official's demise had given rise to many attempts by groups throughout the Fourth District to further sponsor projects on the allegation that they were pledged by McClellan.

Profound Impression
The Torrance Health and Welfare Center was authoritatively endorsed by McClellan as evidenced through documentary representation.

That the Supervisors were undergirded tremendous economic pressure at the present time was fully realized by all present, Quinn continued. However, because he was fully aware of the qualifications Torrance has for the project, Quinn declared he would pledge his vote and cordial support for the measure. In conclusion he stated the entire board was pleased by the very evident spirit of civic interest every person in the delegation exhibited in coming to the hearing and that spirit would not be allowed to wither through the Supervisors' continued budget proceedings.

Chairman Henry W. Wright also thanked the Torrance citizens for attending and lending personal interest to the hearing proceedings. He gave indication that the hearing made a profound impression on him which would not be forgotten when the final budget is approved.
