low on June 25, July 2, 9, 16 and 23. Ten well-selected newspapers will be used and the entire campaign of advertising will appear in the Phoenix, Republic and Gazette, Tucson Star, Yuma Sun, Prescott Courier, San Bernardino Sun-Telegram, Redland News, Riverside Press, Brainerd News, El Centro Imperial Valley News and Bakersfield Californian. These 10 newspapers have a circulation of 191,255.

Follow-Up

In addition to the newspaper advertisements, a pamphlet will be printed and distributed free of charge. Other details that may be requested by summer vacationists now living in the hot beds. The latter material will be used as "follow-up" advertising in response to inquiries from the newspaper advertisements.

The entire campaign is being prepared by Becker-Neely Company, advertising agents of Long Beach, who are also writing and administering the city of Long Beach advertising appropriation this year. Chamber of Commerce directors voted \$1250 last week to cover the entire cost of the six weeks' campaign.

Printed Locally

In order that Torrance citizens may see the type of advertisements to be run by the Chamber of Commerce in the hot section newspapers, the Torrance Herald has offered to print the entire series of six advertisements without cost. The first advertisement will appear in next week's issue, June 25.

### J. C. Smith Says Real Estate Is "Coming Back"

Real estate business in Torrance is making a strong bid for complete recovery, according to J. C. Smith of the Torrance Investment Company, who reported yesterday on a number of transactions that he and his firm had completed within the last few days.

He reported the sale of a five-room stucco house at 2202 Wilmington avenue, to George Morgan for \$4200; the sale of one of the McGrew houses in the 1699 block on Acacia avenue to the First Evangelical Lutheran church for \$4000; the house to become a parsonage; the sale of the Corwin house on Acacia to Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Saichell for \$3500; the lease for one year of the old Independence Drug Company quarters in the Steffen building, corner of Carson and Cabrillo, to Al Johnson, who will move his pool hall there from the Baird building; and the rehab of about 10 houses to out-of-town people during the past week.

"I think that things are looking up a bit in the real estate line," Smith said. "We are getting a number of inquiries about houses to rent from out-of-town people who evidently are attracted here because of the low-rent climate and the unusually cheap rentals."

### Liquor Plant Is Revealed Here By Phone Call

You will find something that will interest you at 2267 Senoma avenue right now if you go out there—but understand that I am in no way connected with it.

This was the telephone message Eleven Police Chief G. M. Calder last week which resulted in the discovery of a completely equipped house "ageing and cutting" plant. The informant refused to give his name or address, but police believe he was the "H. S. Anderson" who rented the house June 2 and moved out eight days later. "Anderson's" real name is thought to be R. A. Shaw of Mantoloking, Ohio.

**Hole Cut in Wall**

More than 175 gallons of whiskey in four barrels and 20 gallons of bottled liquor were found, police reported. There was no evidence of a still being operated in the house—the place being used to age the booze with electric needles and oak bark. A large hole had been cut in a wall that separated a bedroom from the garage to facilitate the loading of trucks. A number of year-old cancelled checks signed by the name of Shaw on an Ohio bank were found.

The raiding officers believe that Shaw and another man operated the plant but had a quarrel and Shaw cleared out and gave the tip-off. No one was found on the premises.
