Freeholders Getting Much Charter Data

(Continued from Page 1-A) and filed with City Clerk A. H. Bartlett. Within 15 days after such filing, the proposed charter will be published in the Herald, copies of it printed in pamphlet form and a notice published to inform the public where copies may be obtained free of charge.

After a period for public consumption and study, the proposed constitution of the city will be submitted to the voters for decision by election at a date fixed by the freeholders' board. This election may be special or in conjunction with a regular general voting date. If ratified by a majority of the voters, the charter is submitted to the State Legislature at its next regular or special session.

The Legislature must approve or reject the Torrance charter as a whole—it cannot be amended in any degree—by a majority of all members elected to each house. This accomplished, the charter, by coming, on notice from the Secretary of State, the operating constitution of the city.

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
