

MARASCHINO CHERRIES AT HOME

It is not too late for cherries and you will want to keep this recipe for next year's use. While the method is simple, it does re-

quire a little time. However, the results are most gratifying. As Maraschino cherries are seldom used in large quantities, it is best to seal them in small containers. If you want green cherries with a mild flavor, use green coloring and mint extract.

**Maraschino Cherries**  
1 1/2 lbs. Royal Anne cherries  
1 oz. red coloring  
3 cups water  
4 1/2 lbs. sugar  
1 oz. almond extract  
Lemon juice to taste

Soak the pitted cherries overnight in a brine made of 2 table-

spoons of salt and 1 teaspoon alum to each quart of water. Wash well until there is not a trace of salt. Now make a heavy syrup of the sugar and water and coloring. Add the cherries and bring gradually to the boiling point. Let stand 24 hours. Then again bring just to the boiling point and again stand until the cherries are plump, and saturated with syrup. On the third morning bring to the boiling point and add the extract. It is desirable that the cherries be put up in this syrup but it may be saved for another batch. If the latter method is to be used,

pack the plump red cherries into small jars and fill up with a slightly thinner syrup, strongly flavored with almond extract; seal and sterilize 10 minutes. If packed in the original syrup, pour enough over to cover, bottle and seal.

Citizens Urge Bishops To Grant Local Pastor Transfer

In a letter addressed to Bishops Frederick D. Leete and Charles Wesley Burns, of the Southern California Conference of the Methodist church, seven prominent Torrance citizens urged this week that Rev. R. A. Young be given an opportunity to extend his service to some other church.

The pastor of the First Methodist church of Torrance ended his term here last Sunday and is awaiting a transfer to another city, very likely within a 10-mile radius of Torrance. 
### Catalina Prepares "Glorious Fourth"
