Group of Independent Grocers Offer Bargains in Full Page Ad

Four independent Torrance grocers, together with A. B. Gardner of Lomita, have joined hands through the Associated Grocers' organization in offering the public rock-bottom prices on staple food products. They are proclaiming these bargains in a full page advertisement printed on another page of this issue. This is the first advertisement to be published since the formation of the Torrance group of Associated Grocers, and others will be published each week hereafter.

Torrance member grocers are: Quality Market, C. M. Howard, owner, 2171 Torrance boulevard; Harder's Market at 1521 Madrid avenue; Woodburn's Grocery at 1801 Cabrillo avenue; and G. H. Colburn at 645 Sartori avenue. A. B. Gardner's Central Market at 2912 Weston street in Lomita, is also a member of the group.

The Associated Grocers' organization of more than 300 independent grocery stores operating in Long Beach, San Pedro, Compton, Doney, Clearwater, and other cities in the greater harbor district, was started last October. According to E. E. Hoagland of the firm of Hoagland and Robbins, wholesalers, the organization has shown a steady growth month by month until today it is one of the largest independent grocery organizations of its kind, not only on the Pacific Coast, but in the entire country.

The purpose of the association is to permit member stores to join in the buying with other member stores, thus obtaining large savings and discounts on their buying because of extensive purchases from the food manufacturers. Although the group is known as the Associated Grocers, no member store loses its identity or independence in any way.

Another outstanding feature of the Associated Grocers' movement is the cooperative advertising practice. Heretofore, sponsors of the movement state, small independent stores were unable to advertise extensively to compete with the very large organizations. The plan of cooperative advertising enables each member store at comparatively little cost to share benefits of large newspaper space.

The Associated Grocers have adopted a uniform color of red and white for all signs and literature. The signature to the advertisements in the newspapers are identical in lettering to those appearing on the outside of each store. A trade mark or character of a smiling grocery man known as "Service Dave" helps save has been adopted and is familiar to all customers who have been patronizing Associated Grocers' stores.

Two Die When Auto Crashes From Blowout

Immediately following a coroner's inquest into the cause of an accident last Friday, in which two people were killed and another severely injured at Vermont avenue and East road, funeral services were held Monday afternoon at Stone and Myers' chapel for one of the victims.

Last rites were held here for Miss Delphine Hoffman, 23, San Pedro, with her mother, brother and other relatives attending. Cremation followed at Pacific Crest Services for Andrew Gray Allen, 40, also of San Pedro, the second victim of the accident, who died in that city Tuesday.

The driver of the machine, a roadster, was Charles L. Walton, San Pedro. Although he admitted on the witness stand that he had indulged in one or two glasses of beer at Allen's home just before the accident, he was declared by examining doctors not to have been intoxicated. The coroner's jury brought in a verdict that the fatal crash, said to have been caused by a blowout while the machine was traveling about 40 miles an hour on Vermont, was accidental and absolved Walton of all blame.

Both Allen and Walton were watchmen at the Federal Reserve bank in Los Angeles and Miss Hoffman was Walton's niece. She died at the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital shortly after the accident. Walton suffered severe head injuries and his right hand was cut and bruised. The car, according to deputy sheriffs, turned over about two times when it became unmanageable. There was no other machine involved in the accident. Allen, who was married, passed away at the scene of the crash.

A handbag, which Walton admitted was his, was found by Sergeant John Stroth, of the local police department, near the scene of the accident. Stroth testified that "some young man" at the crash scene told him Walton had thrown it into a clump of bushes immediately after the accident. Stroth testified that he bag contained five full bottles of home-brew beer and several other broken bottles. Walton, on the stand, stated he had brought the liquor from his home and had not, as deputy sheriffs reported, obtained it at Allen's house.

Now the "meanest thief" has made an appearance in Torrance. Mrs. T. E. Reeve, 1615 Cedar avenue, reported to police last Friday that someone stole a baby-walker from her porch sometime before dark Thursday.

Four Accident Victims Are At Local Hospital

Four men, seriously injured in an intersection accident at 2 a. m. Tuesday morning at Main and Broadway, are being treated at the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial hospital. They are Frank Knudsen, fractured leg; Crist Rosdahl, deep scalp wound; Henry Krist, scalp abrasion, and John Krist, injured knee. All are residents of Hollywood.

The party of four was traveling north on Main street when their car collided with a machine containing Willard Dudley, a sailor, and Newton Matheny, of Los Angeles, according to deputy sheriffs who are investigating the crash. Dudley and Matheny were only slightly injured, it is reported.

Baby-Patient At Hospital Recovers

One of the youngest patients received at the local hospital in recent months was operated on Wednesday for a hand dislocation and is reported well on the road to recovery. He is Johnnie Kirschner, 17-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Kirschner, of Redondo.



Industries of State Greatly Aided By Bill

California industry was materially aided when Governor Rolph signed a bill giving California manufactured products a five per cent preference in bidding on contracts for public works and purchases, according to an announcement made this week by the Pacific Coast Products League of Los Angeles. The bill was one of the record-breaking total signed recently by Governor Rolph, and will go into effect August 14, 1931.

The bill provides that it shall be "discretionary" with public officials and commissions of the state, counties and cities, to give contracts and orders to California manufacturers when their bids or prices are not more than five per cent above the low bid. This applies to purchases of supplies as well as contracts for public works.

Will Reap Benefits

The five per cent preference given California products will give the state's manufacturers a considerable volume of business that previously has gone to out-of-state bidders. This will stimulate California industry and aid in reducing unemployment in the state.

The Pacific Coast Products League pointed out that southern California, being the leading industrial area of the state, will reap the greatest benefits from the preference given California products. Los Angeles County alone produced 42 per cent of the state's manufactured output for 1929, according to the latest Federal figures, made 66 per cent of the state's two-year gain in value of manufactured products and 81 per cent in the number of wage earners employed in the state.
