- The closing up, vacating and abandoning of Klous Avenue, Spinning Avenue and all of that portion of Harding Avenue lying westerly of the northerly prolongation of the easterly line of Lots 5 and 6, as shown on Map of Tract No. 10231, as recorded in Map Book 165, Pages 28 and 27, Records of Los Angeles County, together with all of the alleys shown on Map of said Tract No. 10231.

Want Unimportant Passages in Water Suit Complaint Out

Attorneys representing the city in the water suit to settle the long-pending controversy over the issuance of the \$400,000 bond issue for the construction of a publicly-owned water system are expected to call on the presiding judge of the Superior Court today and present a motion to strike out several passages in the complaint drawn by attorneys acting for a stockholder in the Torrance Water, Light and Power Company.
 City Attorney P. G. Briney reported to the council Tuesday night that the counsel for the city expects to obtain a date for a hearing on the "motion to strike out" within 10 days. The extraneous matter objected to by the city's advisors is superfluous, tends to belittle the issues at stake, will cause undue delay and, are of no legal force whatever in the case, Briney said.

Explains Admissions
 Ed Tansey, who is in charge of operations at the baseball center, amplified the reasons given in the Herald last week as to why a small charge of 25 cents for grandstand seats and a 10-cent charge for ground spectators is made for exhibition games in which the Red-Jackets meet outside teams and the cause for the general admission charge of 10 cents for Tuesday and Thursday night local games.
 "We have a monthly expense of about \$200 to meet and that is why some charge must be made. We also have to pay off the indebtedness owed for the grandstand, which was not built from the Chamber of Commerce appropriation for the lights," Tansey explained.
 "Those fixed expenses must be met or the play cannot go on. We are not going to throw out anybody who cannot pay but we would like to get the financial as well as the moral support of the fans," the baseball manager concluded.

With Ray Sleppy pitching, the Torrance Red-Jackets won their third game within a week when they defeated the San Pedro Cow-boys nine, 13 to 1, at the seaport Monday evening. The game had been scheduled for the Torrance Night Ball field but at the last minute Manager Ed Tansey was forced to take his team to San Pedro for the encounter.
 In the second game, played last Thursday night, on the new illuminated Torrance ball park, the Torrance Red-Jackets handed down a strong Redondo Beach team, 12 to 7, before a crowd almost as large as the mob that attended the dedication of the field a few days before.
 Coggins opened on the mound for the Red Shirts and struck out four bench-combers. Young Pete Higgins, Ed Tansey's downer pitcher, whose odd delivery is a source of high amusement to spectators and much discomfort to the opposing team, relieved Coggins in the sixth and sent five men down the line.
