Lomita Township Farm Report Is Given In Census

Federal Data Shows This District Has Total of 233 Farms

Did you know that Lomita Township, which includes Torrance, Lomita, part of the Palos Verdes Estates and Hollywood Riviera, has 233 farms? And that 14,679 acres are farm land in this township?

This information was released this week by the United States Department of Commerce in connection with the data on agriculture compiled by the Bureau of Census, 1930. The figures given are of April 1, 1930.

Lomita township's agricultural resources are listed as follows in this authentic report: 8,573 acres of crops harvested; 397 acres were lying idle or fallow at the time of the census and only 19 acres were reported as crop failures.

Specified farm values as of April 1, 1930, were as follows: All farm buildings were valued at \$280,370; farmers' dwellings at \$146,420, and farm implements and machinery, \$121,555. There were 12,653 farms in Los Angeles county when the census was taken. These were located on 527,124 acres of land, which, together with buildings and machinery were valued at more than \$185,000,000.
