George Watson's nice bingle in the sixth sent Wolfe home to tie the score. Wiltee annexed the Vets' second tally in the seventh. Dan Leonard's three-bagger in the eighth pushed Vanderhake home for the Red Jackets' second score and in the tenth frame, Wolfe stole home on a fair play to win the game for the Tansy-men.


