Official World War History Is Published By U. S. Government

Veterans of the World War will be interested to learn that the War Department has just announced the publication of the "Order of Battle of the United States Land Forces in the World War—A, E, L, Divisions," which was compiled in the Historical Section of the Army War College from original sources in the War Department.

The text, which is limited to a statement of facts without comment, makes for the first time a comprehensive official digest of the principal events in the histories of the 43 American Divisions that served in France, together with an accurate day by day record of their front lines and combat sectors.

From Start to Finish It covers organization, transportation to France, movements to training areas and combat sectors, battle participation, and post-armistice activities, to include return to the United States and demobilization. In addition to these narratives, it contains tables which give the names of divisions and United States Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C.

AGRICULTURE FACES GREAT "UPHEAVAL"

By the United Press SACRAMENTO.—Agriculture in California is on the verge of a great economic upheaval. Overproduction and underconsumption are the twin evils that have brought about this condition, according to Secretary of State Frank C. Jordan, himself one of the few genuine "dirt farmers" among the various state officials. Prices for nearly every agricultural product in the state are low compared with the prices paid for goods they buy and payments they must make, Jordan said. As a result, farm incomes aren't high enough to maintain or increase standards of living and acquire independent ownership. "Unsatisfactory returns from farm products have been reflected in reduced real estate values," said Jordan. "The 1931 census placed a value of 3 1/2 billion dollars on the 135,000 farms in California.

This lowered value was reflected to some extent in Los Angeles, where the total value of all farms was reported by the last census at \$177,943,028. The average value per farm in the county was \$37,773.
