Fall Cruises To Hawaii Resumed

Following a precedent of several years standing, the Los Angeles Steamship Company will again this fall send out a group of its popular, personally-escorted fall cruises to Hawaii, aboard the Lasso flag-ship, City of Los Angeles, it was announced this week by Ralph J. Chandler, vice president and general manager of the line.

The cruises will go out on the October 10, November 7 and December 5 sailings of the City of Los Angeles. Each will be in charge of a representative of the passenger department who will be personally responsible for seeing that members of his party are relieved of all the sometimes annoying details of travel, such as baggage checking, hotel reservations, sight-seeing arrangements, and the like. As usual with Lasso tours, the fall cruises will be all-inclusive, a single quotation covering transportation and all necessary ship and shore expenses for the duration of the trip. Each cruise will occupy 20 days from Los Angeles back to Los Angeles.

With the experience of past years as a guide, the cruises this fall are expected to be even more comprehensive than in former years. Each tour will be entirely leisurely in character and will include a maximum of sight-seeing in and around Honolulu as well as the spectacular trip to the Big Island of Hawaii and Kilauea volcano.

Clubwomen in San Francisco, Oakland, Berkeley and other cities have taken up the controversy and have endeavored to set their sisters in Antioch right. But said sisters have broken into print to declare that their husbands, in a number of instances, have already set them right!

Males Up In Arms
One husband is reported to have ordered his wife to remain in the home indefinitely, according to meager information emanating from the battlefield. Another refuses to speak to his wife any more and several of the Mr.'s have held meetings, trying to puzzle out the whole thing.

The now-famous debate was won by the side which argued that the perfect vacation was one taken by husband and wife separately. One of the debaters, carrying the argument to a logical conclusion, bravely suggested that the idea of using a gigolo as a dancing partner on solo vacations had its merits. And the gigolo theme was what caused the greater part of the ruckus. Anyway, the ladies insisted afterwards that the entire debate was merely a joke.

"A debate is a debate and a joke is a joke—but a townful of angry husbands is something else again," wrote a member of the debate teams in explanation of the matter in a recent issue of the Pittsburg newspaper. Public Invited to Concert Friday Evening



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Oil On Beaches Curb Sought At Meeting, Oct. 6

Coast to Plan Relief Move at Long Beach; City Is Invited

Plans for a campaign with renewed vigor against the pollution of Southern California beaches are to be laid at a mass meeting of representatives of chambers of commerce, civic bodies, state, county and city officials from Santa Barbara to San Diego, to be held at Bixby Park, Long Beach, on the afternoon of October 6. The Long Beach Chamber is sponsoring the great meeting.

Torrance civic groups, city officials and representative citizens have been invited to attend. As the movement is in accord with action taken from time to time by the county supervisors against the oil menace, Supervisors Quinn and Thatcher will represent that body at the meeting.

The conference is being held to settle on a definite course of action in connection with beach pollution. Communities of the Pacific Slope have from time to time, individually sought relief from this damaging evil without any apparent results thus far. It is reported, although national and state legislation has been enacted prohibiting the dumping of oil on our beaches.

The present problem, as those interested in the movement see it, is the enforcement of these laws. Citizens experienced in the past indicate that concerted action is necessary in order to bring about positive relief and it is with this in view that the conference is being called. Henry W. Wright, chairman of the board of supervisors, has declared that Los Angeles county will do everything possible to aid in the movement.

Duck Season Is Only 30 Days

Drought Conditions Curtail Hunting Period In State

Because of disastrous conditions caused by prolonged drought in migratory wild fowl breeding areas in Canada, duck season will be open for one month only in California and 19 other states. The season, according to S. S. Worrell, county clerk, will open November 16 and close December 15, dates inclusive. "The biological survey of the United States government states that the drought that has necessitated the curtailment of the season has occurred in the principal wild fowl breeding grounds in northwestern United States and in western and southwestern Canada," Worrell said. "The disappearance of sloughs and marshes from much of this great region has prevented the birds from rearing normal numbers of young, and as a result the annual flight of ducks and geese this fall is expected to be the poorest on record."
