



Has Your Driver's License Expired?

Warning Issued That Licenses Issued After August 14, 1929, Are Invalid and Holders Must Apply for Renewal

Look at your driver's license and see if it has expired! This warning was issued to motorists of California this week by the Department of Motor Vehicles when a check revealed that several thousand licenses issued after August 14, 1929, have expired and are therefore invalid.

Licenses issued after August 14, 1929, it was explained, are good for two years from date of issuance and show the expiration date on the lower left hand corner. Licenses issued before August 14, 1929, and after January 1, 1927, are good until revoked and need not be renewed at this time. If, therefore, the license bears the notation, "good until revoked," and was issued between these dates, the holder has nothing to worry about. Licenses issued before January 1, 1927, were revoked two years ago by the Department of Motor Vehicles and are invalid. The important point stressed by the department is that the motorist look at his license and see if it was issued after August 14, 1929, and has expired. If it has expired the driver should apply for renewal at the nearest branch of the Department of Motor Vehicles, California Highway Patrol, or other authorized examining agency.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE ORDERING IMPROVEMENT TO BE MADE AS CALLED FOR IN ORDINANCE OF INTENTION NUMBER 224, TO-WIT, THE WIDENING OF SEPULVEDA BOULEVARD AND A PORTION OF HAWTHORNE AVENUE IN SAID CITY.

Whereas the City Council of the City of Torrance did, by Ordinance Number 224, entitled, "An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Torrance Declaring its Intention to Order the Widening of Sepulveda Boulevard from the Western Boundary of the City of Torrance to the Eastern Boundary of the City of Torrance, and the Widening of a portion of Hawthorne Avenue in said City," adopted on the 10th day of August, 1931, declare its intention to make certain improvements consisting of the widening of Sepulveda Boulevard and a portion of Hawthorne Avenue in said City, as more particularly set forth in said ordinance, reference to which is hereby made for further particulars, and

Whereas the notices as required by the Street Opening Act of 1903 in said ordinance more particularly referred to have been made and given, and affidavits of posting notices and mailing of notices so required to be posted and mailed have been filed with the City Clerk of the City of Torrance, and all protests and objections to the proposed improvement have been heard at a hearing at the time and place fixed in said notices, and

Whereas all written protests filed were representative of less than six per cent of the area of the district to be assessed to pay the cost of such improvement and all such protests have been overruled and denied, and the City Council of the City of Torrance having thereby acquired jurisdiction to proceed with the improvement above mentioned, now, therefore,

Section 2.
It is hereby ordered that the improvement above referred to and more particularly described in Ordinance Number 224 of the City of Torrance, reference to which ordinance is hereby made for further particulars, be made, and the City Attorney of the City of Torrance is hereby directed to bring an action in the proper superior court in the name of the City of Torrance for the condemnation of the property necessary and convenient to be taken for such improvement and as particularly described in said Ordinance Number 224 as being necessary and convenient to be taken for that purpose, reference to which ordinance is hereby made for a more particular description of said property.

Section 3.
The City Clerk of the City of Torrance shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper of general circulation, printed and published in the City of Torrance.
