## More Than Half of Calif. Babies Institution-Born



It's getting to be old fashioned for a baby to be born "at home." "And a good thing for the baby, too," adds the state board of health. More than half of all infants born in California are born in maternity homes and hospitals, a report of the department of health reveals.

At the same time the statistics show that the child born where the mother is under the direct care of specialists has a greater chance of living than the infant born in private home.

In 1930, out of 51,342 registered births, 48,345 occurred in maternity homes and hospitals, or 57.3 per cent of the total. The infant mortality rate for the state as a whole in 1930 was 53.6, while the infant mortality rate for infants born in the maternity homes and hospitals was 21.7.

### Special Trade Days Said Sales Stimulus

Special trade promotion events, such as Dollar Days, Old-Home Weeks, Community Sales Days, and other all-city sales periods were outlined and described to Torrance Kiwanians by William L. Ware, field representative of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, Monday evening. Ware, who has traveled extensively for the L. A. organization, declared that merchants in various cities who have combined to promote such events have found them to be great trading stimuli. "This is the day of promotion and you have got to offer your residents special events with all of you cooperating if you want to put money in circulation and release frozen savings," Ware said. At the conclusion of the talk, President Sam Rappaport suggested it would be a good thing for the merchants of the city to meet and formulate some such trade event for Torrance.

### Relief Society Aids Families In Their Need

throughout the list of the 200 odd families who have received help from the Relief Society during the past nine months. Need is increasing now. "We have noted that within the last few days more requests have been coming to us for aid," said a Relief worker. "The men themselves have come to our headquarters on Cabrillo avenue next to Woodburn's grocery store and, hesitatingly told us of their condition and asked—even begged for aid. This coming winter is going to be a severe test of our ability to meet the demand." Out in "no-man's land"—the Shoestring strip—where the needy have been forgotten by both county and Los Angeles city relief agencies—the Torrance Relief Society is working to help. It sends its baskets of food and distributes clothing. Somebody has got to take care of those people and because they are more of Torrance than "of Los Angeles" they look to this city for aid. Relief workers told me that no particular part of Torrance is free from the grip of actual deprivation. All sections of the city have their "cases."

### Expressing the Society's Code

"We are not handing out food and clothing without some assurance that the need is vital. We have taken steps to remove undesirable who have come here because they heard Torrance was an 'easy' town. Every basket of food sent out is made up of things we know fits the requirements of the family to which it is sent. Our divisions will not permit haphazard distribution of food and clothing as we have to make every penny count. There are very little for maintenance of our headquarters and we are not working for individual glory or honor. The Relief Society is as impersonal as any welfare agency can be. We have a job and we know it." That was the way a worker expressed her idea of the Relief organization and it expressed the keen sense of duty that every member feels. They know their job and are doing it. But they need your help.

### Old Ironton Hotel Emerges As A New, Modern Hostelry, Cafe

The new Hotel Royal in Torrance is a hotel with a past. From a somewhat dingy, poorly furnished and iron-ton bedded history it has been changed into a modern, artistically decorated and renovated hostelry that has already made it an attractive addition to the housing equipment of the city.

Credit for this is due Mr. and Mrs. Keith Daniels, the new owners. Motion picture people, owners of a large apartment in Hollywood and a young couple with a fine sense of courtesy, the Daniels have transformed the former Ironton Hotel, on Border avenue, into the Hotel Royal and its adjoining cafe where hospitality and service go hand in hand.

A Hotel's Transformation They told the story of the Ironton's improvement this week to a Herald representative. "The scene of the interview was in the newly decorated and refurbished lobby where heavy velvet drapes framed the front windows which had been undraped and bare in "the old days." A heavy-pile carpet has replaced the cold linoleum. A beautiful tapestry hangs on one wall that had previously been decorated with only a large chromo calendar. Comfortable upholstered chairs and a luxurious davenport takes the places of half a score of hard wooden chairs. The walls, silver with gold trim, the lighting fixtures all new and the fireplace re-decorated has changed the lobby into an up-to-date reception room. "We have spent \$2000 already in furnishings and we won't be through with Hotel Royal until another \$3000 goes into the place," Daniels said. "The rooms will be entirely renovated and the shower baths installed in many of them. The Hotel Royal will be equipped with a new Metlox sign of distinctive construction and the front of the building redecorated."

### Real Italian Spaghetti

A feature of the cafe service is the real Italian spaghetti dinners which are served every night. This specialty is concocted by an Italian chef brought to the Hotel Royal by the Daniels from Hollywood. Incidentally, Daniels being of Italian descent, takes keen delight in supervising the cooking of this dish. As a motion picture producer and director, Daniels has won a reputation for turning out Western all-talking dramas which are being featured in some of the south's biggest movie palaces. His de-

### Old Policy Saves City From Severe Shock This Week

It's a good thing the city council is not in a habit of counting their appropriations before they are deposited in the city treasury in the form of hard cash.

Because such a policy would have given the city a severe shock this week when they learned that the reported appropriations to Torrance from state gasoline tax and motor vehicle license funds, amounting to \$25,000, were almost all expended already by the county for the city's benefit.

The county auditor informed the council by letter that \$15,000 of the appropriation was given the city last February for use in relieving unemployment and that \$12,000 of the remaining \$14,000 went for the city's share in the improvement of the Western avenue-El Prado crossing. No actual cash will be turned over to the city, the auditor said.
