Armistice observance will begin with the pronouncement of the invocation by Rev. Kemp J. Winkler, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church of this city.

Sawtelle Veteran to Speak The singing of "America" by all present will be led by Herbert Wood, principal of the High school. Songs will be given by the High school glee club, which is known as the Madrigal Singers.

A feature of the program will be the presentation of the song "The Trumpeter" by J. E. Williams, accompanied by Alex Mac-Phail, Legionnaire from Lomita, who will play the trumpet obbligato.

Major J. Carl Shindler, of Sawtelle, will be the Armistice Day speaker. While the topic of his talk has not been learned here, it is expected that Major Shindler, who is well known in Southern California, will have a message of great interest to those who attend the program.

Benediction will be pronounced by the Rt. Rev. Fr. Daniel Hurley, pastor of the Catholic church of the Nativity.

To Conclude at 11 P. M. The entire observance will conclude by 11 o'clock to allow the spectators and those participating in the Torrance program ample time to attend the St. Mary's U. C. A. Legion-sponsored football game at the Los Angeles Olympic Stadium.

L. A. PROGRAM AND GAME PLANS ARE TOLD

Plans for a huge all-day Armistice celebration to be held in Los Angeles, were announced today by Roy S. Stockton, newly elected Commander of The Los Angeles Council of the American Legion. The exercises will start with a big parade followed by an elaborate exhibition by drum corps and drill teams, in mid-afternoon, after which the regular Armistice program consisting of speeches by prominent citizens, State and Legion officials, will follow. This program will start at 9:30 a. m.

The afternoon program which will feature the big football game between St. Mary's and U.C.L.A., will start with a sensational military pageant in which a massed band of two hundred pieces and a drum corps of four hundred pieces will take part. Following that there will be exhibitions by champion Legion drill teams, after which the Goodwill Blank will fly over the stadium and drop the football which will start the game.

One-third of the proceeds from this football game will go to the American Legion Service Bureau which is the Legion's relief agency for disabled and needy veterans.

Tickets for this contest can be secured from any Post of the American Legion.
