Around Gardena-way they're saying that Los Angeles Municipal Judge Ida May Adams couldn't "take it" as she "dishes it out." Those phrases are being used because Editor Lewis T. Gould, Jr., publisher of the Gardena Valley News, cleverly turned a bit of movie ballyhoo into a description of the arrest of Judge Adams for a traffic violation last week. Editor Gould has this to say in his last week's issue under his headline "L. A. Judge Can Dish It Out But Can She Take It?" They say, concerning a famous

movie gangster that he could dish it out but he couldn't take it. Now, Gardena City Police Judge A. W. McGovney is going to have an opportunity to find out whether Judge Ida May Adams can "take it" as well as "dish it out."

"All because Judge Adams, who has a reputation in the Los Angeles traffic court of handing out stiff sentences to law violators, was handed a ticket by Motorcycle Officer George Schache Sunday night at Riverside-Redondo boulevard and Western for failure to make a boulevard stop.

"Judge Adams apparently is no different after all from other traffic violators, for according to reports, she claims that she was only going about five miles an hour and besides, due to the darkness she did not see the stop sign. The motor officer claims that she

## Tourists Pour Into State To Set New Mark

Fiesta Year Attraction For 113,885 Vehicles Up To October 1

Tourists? You can't keep 'em out of California. The Golden State, Fiesta Year, a matchless, if at times "unusual" climate — there's a trinity of magnets irresistible to the motorist, guest, and Victor Killick, statistician of the Department of Motor Vehicles furnishes proof today with facts indicating a huge increase in the western legions via national highways.

Shooting into the state from north, east and south to October 1, this year, Killick revealed, 113,885 vehicles bearing licenses issued in other states or countries than

California have been checked at border stations maintained by the Highway Patrol. This number is more than 12,000 in excess of such cars as arrived in the corresponding period of 1930.

One third of these cars, or 44,305, arrived through Yuma, the main southern portal of California; 20,000 arrived via Daguerre and approximately 15,000 through Dunsmuir, the chief gateway from Oregon. Another 14,000 reached California via Crescent City and Eureka, while 13,000 came in via Yermo and 6,000 via Myers and Donners Pass.

"In all, 323,443 persons were traveling in the 113,885 cars checked in at our border stations during the first nine months of the year," said Killick. "A gain of nearly 50,000 over the 264,506 arriving by highway in foreign-licensed cars during the first three-quarters of 1930."
