ARMISTICE OBSERVANCE IS CITY'S FINEST SINCE 1918

The First Minnesota cavalry at the beginning of the Civil War and who served two years, rode in a top-down sedan.

Four God Star Mothers, who lost sons in the last great conflict, were in the following machine. They were Mrs. Nellie Crossland, 1330 Engracia avenue; Mrs. W. S. Bush, 1731 Plaza del Amo; Mrs. Bertha Blaine King, Lomita; and Mrs. Jennie Lane, 721 Arlington avenue.

Grouped colors of the Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Business and Professional Women's club, and the two auxiliaries preceded two Red Cross nurses who saw active service in France. They were Miss Esther Z. Maxwell and Mrs. George B. Worcester.

Wood Shepherd "Flock"
Their white and black uniforms and brilliantly polished helmets made the Legion Drum and Bugle Corps musicians stand out as a colorful marching unit. At intervals they rang the air with their bugles and the rhythmic roll of their drums.

Between 300 and 325 school children—of all sizes—followed the Legion corps. Each had been given a small flag which received warm exercise as the tiny tots and older boys and girls shouted and waved to friends in the section or parents on the sidewalk. Herbert Wood was a good shepherd to this flock.

Christmas Reminder
Bringing a reminder of Christmas to come, Frank Buffington, manager of the J. C. Penney Company store here, piloted a motorized version of Santa Claus' pack. Loaded to overflowing with toys and with the Yuletide saint making an early appearance by riding on the hood, the Penney float was an outstanding attraction. In its wake were eight or ten youngsters, early dressed in green and red jackets and caps, who rode in various types of wagons—all towed by Buffington's float.

The second division of the parade, commanded by Alfred Gour-dier, postmaster, was led by his Spanish-American War veterans. Eleven more veterans of Foreign Wars, led by Commander Gardner, who was recently elected to that office, preceded 12 members of the auxiliary of that organization.

Only 13 members of the Torrance Legion participated in the line of march in addition to the Drum corps.

Undaunted Clubmen
Ray Parks commanded the third division, which consisted of a few undaunted Rotarians and Kiwanians and a good delegation of the Business and Professional Women club, Legion Auxiliary and the Woman's club.

The Torrance Boys' band, led by Ralph Selby, headed the fourth division which was commanded by Lieutenant Hare, of the Torrance Military Academy. The band was followed by the cadets and three units of Boy Scouts. The Rotary-sponsored Troop No. 3, had the largest attendance in this group and swung along with fine military precision.

On reaching the High school field, the parade swung around the track and disbanded. A few minutes after 10 o'clock the program started with G. L. Morris, chairman of the day, at the microphone which amplified the speaking and singing events.

Drills by the Drum Corps and Academy cadets, and a number by the Boys' band, received loud applause from the spectators seated about the field and in the bleachers. This section was almost filled to capacity.

Rev. Kamp J. Winkler, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, asked for continued world peace in his invocation which formally opened the observance of the day. The entire audience sang "America," led by Herbert Wood and accompanied by the Boys' band. Directed by Mrs. Marjorie

Eischen, the High school Madrigal Singers, wearing their colorful costumes and brilliant sashes, sang several numbers without accompaniment. Chairman Morris made a number of introductions of those on the speakers' platform.

"The Trumpeter," as sung by J. E. Williams, accompanied by Mrs. Juliette Johnson on the piano and Legionnaire Jim Steger with the trumpet, was a very fine performance.

Major J. Carl Behndler, assistant librarian of the National Military Home at Sawtelle, was the speaker of the day. He paid high tribute to ex-service men, the auxiliaries and mothers attending and then spoke briefly of the import of Armistice Day and how it means a full knowledge of problems facing America and the need for every citizen to have faith in the future of this nation.

Benediction was pronounced by the Rt. Rev. Fr. Vincent Lloyd Russell, D. P. and St. D., of San Pedro.

The military rifle salute and taps by the buglers ended the morning's observance.

Realty Market Gain Reported In October

While real estate transfers last month as evidenced by deed filings in the incorporated cities in Los Angeles county were one-fifth less in number than they were in October, 1930, there was a gain of over three per cent in comparison with September, 1931, according to the California Title Insurance company.

The local realty market showed a gain of 25 per cent in volume of transfers during October over those for the preceding month. There were 49 deeds, two mortgages and 13 trust deeds filed in October affecting local real estate, compared with 33 deeds and eight trust deeds for September.

There were eight new subdivisions, containing a total of 66 lots, opened in the county last month.


Latter Day Society Will Hold Bazaar
