

# CADETS PLAY CHARITY GAME HERE SATURDAY

## TICKETS NOW ON SALE FOR BENEFIT CONTEST AT HIGH SCHOOL FIELD, 2:30 P. M.

### Undeclared Torrance "Mules" Meet St. John's "Fighting Irish" To Help Relief Society Aid Local Needy Families This Winter

Tickets went on sale this week at several locations for the benefit football game between the Torrance Military Academy and St. John's M. A., at the High school field, this Saturday afternoon, November 14. All of the proceeds from the game—the first of its kind to be held here—will be given to the Torrance Relief Society for extending food and clothing to needy local families.

Permission to use the High school field and bleachers was obtained this week from the Board of Education. The game will begin promptly at 2:30 o'clock. The tickets are selling at 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for students. Tickets are on sale at the two banks, all drug stores, Chamber of Commerce and the Torrance Herald. It is hoped that a large number of fans will purchase their tickets in advance of Saturday's game so that the word of the charity contest will be spread around and a large attendance be on hand for the event.

### Youngsters Show Fight

Before hostilities start between the two teams, dress parades of both academies will be held and other grid entertainment given. The benefit contest is sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and has received hearty endorsement from J. W. Post, chairman of the campaign to raise funds for the Relief Society.

Those who have not seen the cadets in action on a previous date have a real treat as those youngsters turn out a fighting brand of football. All of the team members of both squads are smaller and lighter than High school players and they have demonstrated that they know the game very well.

### "Mules" vs. "Fighting Irish"

The local cadet team is known at the academy as the "Mules" while St. John's team bears the impressive nick-name of the "Fighting Irish." The Torrance team has not lost a game all season and available reports on St. John's show that they have only met one defeat so far.

## Whole County May Be Zoned For Industries

### Survey Committee To Meet In San Pedro Friday To Plan Work

To make the first steps toward an industrial survey to be conducted on the zone system, the Harbor District Industrial Survey Committee, composed of representative members of the Los Angeles, Long Beach, Wilmington, San Pedro, Torrance and Harbor District Chambers of Commerce, will meet at Hacienda La Rambla in San Pedro tomorrow, Friday, noon.

This group, recently organized to obtain data for present and potential industrial future in the Los Angeles Harbor Area, is a better location than any other Pacific Coast port territory, will probably extend its survey until the entire county has been thoroughly studied to determine the industrial development and its relation to the Los Angeles and Long Beach harbors.

### City In Seven-Mile Zone

By zoning the territory surrounding the two harbors, the committee hopes to first bring the area in the immediate two-mile zone nearest the harbors. Then a five-mile strip adjoining the first zone will be zoned for industrial information, housing facilities, rail and transportation outlets, roads and other data. Torrance is included in this zone.

Other sections to be investigated in the future until the entire county would be studied and data obtained that would give Los Angeles county booster organizations the most comprehensive and valuable collection of information ever compiled on the industry. Local members of the survey committee are W. Rufus Page, Harbor District Chambers of Commerce representative, and Carl Hyde, of the Torrance chamber. Both will attend the meeting tomorrow noon and bring back reports to their respective organizations.

## Marine League Season Ends With Friday's Games; Jordan On Top

### Torrance Plays Gardena Here; Narbonne Contacts Jordan; Both Local Teams Hope for Upsets

Tomorrow, Friday, afternoon about 4:45 p. m., the Marine League football season will pass into history. It has been a season of a great come-backs and great victories for Jordan High school and a trial of sorrow for Torrance High. Jordan is being tabbed today as the champion. True, Jordan meets Narbonne tomorrow—but a team that has beaten Gardena, Banning, Riis, Bell and South Gate in a row, shouldn't have difficulty in getting over the Lomita Gauchos who have won from Torrance, Riis and El Segundo, and dropped to Leuzinger and Banning.

### Last Game Here

Torrance, tied with South Gate for cellar honors, is host to that up-and-coming Gardena eleven which has beaten Riis, Bell, South Gate and Leuzinger and lost but to Jordan.

### Local supporters of the Tartar horde, which has belied its formidable name de guerre this season, are hoping against hope that the Torrance eleven will hit its stride in this last game and upset Coach Jordan's Freeman's Gardena Berserkers. This may happen—and nothing could please the adult fans and student body better. But on paper it looks impossible. Unquestionably, Torrance has the material to do the best thing—everything he's got up his directorial sleeve into tomorrow's contest. It all depends on the squad.

### Narbonne-Jordan

Gardena tossed the prize upset of the Marine League season into the score books last Friday when they rushed the heretofore unbeaten Leuzinger eleven into an 18-0 defeat on the job yard home lot. Fullback Donnelly was the Berry-picker who put the skids under Leuzinger's championship hopes, as he accounted for all three touchdowns. Twice Donnelly dashed over on short runs through the line, while his third touchdown resulted after he had received a pass. Gardena scored in all but the second quarter.

Down Lomita-way, Narbonne is in somewhat the same fix as Torrance. The Gauchos are hoping an upset will give them a victory over Jordan. This game is the high light of the week's contests and should draw an impressive array of spectators. Narbonne crumpled El Segundo, 59-0, last week-end, exhibiting the most powerful offense yet this season.

## All Gauchos Get In Grid Track Fest

LOMITA.—Every Gaucho was given a chance to play Friday when the biggest score of the Marine League this season was piled up by Narbonne against El Segundo. Nine touchdowns with a 59 to 0 score were made by the Gauchos. Watanabe and Dalape each made three touchdowns and two sensational runs, one for 90 yards and one for 80.
