Although we didn't intend to comment on football at all in our column, several things have come to our attention concerning that late lamented sport in this league which deserve mention. And then, "Sideliner" re-appeared in his column with the provision that he was to continue printing his weekly football predictions until that sport had tripped off the stage.

We learned from a Herald reporter that Narbonne was given a "talking to" about unnecessary rough play and was told by the Marine League officials to go home and "clean up." While we don't intend to take sides in the matter, we believe that any school guilty of poor sportsmanship should be given a talking to. It is quite different from college football—and if those kids don't learn clean play in high school—where in this green earth will they learn it?

One more item about football and we're through. The Marine League last week voted to recommend to the C. I. F. (California Interscholastic Federation), which controls athletics, extra curricular activities, etc., that spring football should be eliminated. The League said that such practice would be defined by the issuing of football equipment and the holding of practice scrimmages. Action on this recommendation is to come at the December C. I. F. meeting.

We don't hold with Sideliner's emphasis on high school football. The game is merely incidental to the greater idea of education. That's why we lend our modest approval to the Marine League's proposal. There is ample time in the fall for football practice; the spring months have their limit of athletic activities—track, tennis, and baseball.

proved, have left many children with weakened vitality and therefore more readily susceptible to tuberculosis and at the same time increased the number of active cases. Unless these children are found in time and through proper nutrition, rest and personal care, restored to health, they will not only become hopelessly bed-ridden or crippled, but also, if such cases continue unknown in school, they will infect others with whom they come in contact.

"The seriousness of the problem is apparent in the number of requests for physical and chest x-ray examinations in school, received by our Association during the past two months from superintendents of Los Angeles County schools. All money received for Christmas Seals will go toward medical and x-ray diagnosis among school children and necessary follow-up work, including nutritionists to help mothers on meager budgets to prepare nourishing food at low cost."

The Christmas Seal this year is green and white and depicts a Colonial stage coach, and it is the twenty-fifth Seal issued by the National Tuberculosis Association. The crimson double-barred cross identifies it as the official insignia of the National Tuberculosis Association of which the Los Angeles County Tuberculosis and Health Association is the local affiliated organization.

VEGETABLES

Two dishes with unusual appetizing appeal are Tarte aux Oignons and Spinach a la Touraine. Both show the French knack of achieving particularly delicious results with every-day foods.

Tarte aux Oignons

Slice thin four large onions. Put in a quart of cold, salted water. Add a teaspoon of sugar and bring to a boil on a quick fire. Cook

a few minutes. Remove from the fire and drain. Add the onions to a quart of a pound of butter that has been melted in a saucepan, and cook until they are lightly browned. Add three slices of bacon that have been cut into small pieces and cooked in butter. Let the mixture cool until it is just warm. Add three eggs beaten lightly with four tablespoons of cream. Fill tart shells with the mixture, pour melted butter over them, and bake until set. Put a peck of washed spinach in a saucepan with one and a half cups of water and one teaspoon of sugar. Cook for twenty minutes. Drain and press through a colander. Mix in three-quarters teaspoon salt, one-quarter teaspoon paprika, and two tablespoons butter. Heat again and then press firmly into a bowl to mold. Turn the spinach out upside down on a platter, garnish with slices of lemon and hard-boiled eggs, and serve immediately.
