Salads and Sauces For Thanksgiving

Salad Marinade (Mixes about 1/2 cup) 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon pepper

French, cooked vegetables, meats and fish are marinated in this dressing; that is, the dressing is added to the salad ingredients which are allowed to stand for an hour or so until well seasoned. Each salad ingredient is marinated separately. The ingredients are then drained and combined and the salad is served with additional dressing, French, mayonnaise or a cooked dressing.

Add 1/2 teaspoon onion juice to marinade if desired. Or if garlic flavor is desired, rub bowl in which marinade is made with cut clove of garlic.

Tartare Sauce (Serves 6-8) 1 cup mayonnaise 1/2 teaspoon onion juice, or 1 tablespoon chopped chives 2 tablespoons chopped sweet pickles or green relish 1 teaspoon chopped parsley Lemon juice Combine ingredients and thin to desired consistency with lemon juice.

Variations: Chopped celery, Capers, Chopped pineapples, Chili Sauce, Worcestershire Sauce, Tabasco. The flavor of onion is essential to all Tartare Sauce.

Walteria Man Charged With Gun Assault

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The Osbornes, according to statements made to police, were separated for about two months up until two weeks ago. Mrs. Osborne and her 4-year-old daughter had stayed with the Mallos during the marital disturbance.

Mrs. Mallo's Story

When questioned by Police Chief Calder, Police Judge C. T. Rippy and a Herald representative the morning after the shooting, Mrs. Mallo told the following story from her bed:

Mrs. Osborne came to the Mallo home to find out how Mrs. Mallo was getting on and to obtain some of her daughter's clothing. She came in the room where Mrs. Mallo was lying and was followed by her husband, the suspected assaulter, and Mallo.

All the time she was here, she kept winking at me—as if trying to tell me something or warn me," Mrs. Mallo continued. "I didn't know what she meant but I believe now it was to tell me her husband had a gun and was looking for trouble—although, as far as I know, he had no quarrel with my husband.

Osborne, without saying anything, jumped from where he was standing and yelled something at my husband, who was standing at the foot of my bed. I don't remember what it was—it may have been, "You won't tell any more lies about me," I don't know. Then he hit Mr. Mallo across the face stomach and fired my voice. Osborne turned to me and yelled, "Shut up—or you'll get it too!"

Denies Being in Room

"My husband staggered out of the room, into the kitchen and I learned later, out in the yard. Osborne followed him out and then Mrs. Osborne yelled to him: "Why don't you kill him and put him out of his misery!" I could swear to that. I was still screaming and crying and Mrs. Osborne told me not to be afraid as her husband wouldn't shoot me."

When questioned at the police station after Mrs. Mallo's account of the shooting had been heard, Mrs. Osborne denied she had been in the room at the time of the tragedy, saying she was in the kitchen picking up her daughter's clothes.

Mrs. Osborne also her husband put Mallo out of his misery." She could give no reason for the shooting, although she said that there "had been bad blood" between the two men ever since Mallo had been arrested by local officers and taken to the Psychopathic Ward in Los Angeles for treatment and observation.

Held Without Bail

Mallo was cited to the ward, October 9 when his wife signed a complaint charging him with evidence of insanity. He was released after a few days and local police believe he was merely suffering from a protracted drinking bout.

Osborne, who is a longshoreman when employed, is asserted by police to have been engaged in the liquor traffic prior to the shooting, as evidence was uncovered during the search Thursday night for Osborne's asserted revolver, that tended to show such dealings.

Throughout the whole investigation, Osborne, red-headed, lean faced and slight of build, remained non-committal. He refused to give any account of the shooting other than to disclaim ownership of the revolver found by police. He gave no indication of a defense when arraigned before Police Judge Rippy Friday morning, and was remanded back to jail without bail after the brief reading of the "assault to commit murder" complaint that was signed by Chief Calder.

Dressing That Festive Board

What is most likely to inspire gratitude in the heart of a Thanksgiving hostess nowadays is the knowledge that her dinner table is a joy to look at—that the blending of colors in the center-piece and china and crystal is perfect, and that her linen and silver are beautifully decorative. For this is a matter which still remains an individual problem for women all over our broad land, a matter in which they may still show their skill, ingenuity and good taste.

Even as in the old days we like a bit of pomp and ceremony connected with the holiday feast and these we find today in the table setting. Silver, for instance, in one of the lovely old-time patterns, a silver bowl may be used for a centerpiece, and let it be dripping over with big bunches of grapes, and piled with red apples and oranges. Let the silver candlesticks be filled and lighted, and there are such lovely silver service plates, goblets and small dishes to add to its glitter. Then there's the big silver platter and the vegetable dishes of the same metal, which do keep the foods so nice and hot.

Where to Place 'em

And young hostesses, lay your table so carefully with its shining new silver things. Remember that after all, conventions are founded on good sense and common sense. The silver should be placed so that the guest commences with the outside piece and uses each in succession toward the plate. This keeps the cover uniform during the whole meal and the guests are never in doubt as to the correct piece to use. Knives are placed at the right of the cover. By cover is meant the silver, linen and glass placed on the table for each person. The cutting edges of the knife is toward the plate; when all the knives are placed then the spoons are laid with their bowls turned up at the right of the knives.

Coffee Before the Fire

Forks are placed at the left, with the tines up. If the first course is oysters, the oyster fork may be placed at the extreme right which is one exception to the usual rule. Place only three pieces of silver on either side and if additional silver is needed let it be brought in later. After dinner coffee spoons are always placed on the saucers.

The napkin, folded in a square

or rectangle is at the left of the cover as near the silver as possible without touching it or it may be laid on the service plate if one is used. The glass is placed at the right near the point of the knife; if a second glass is used it is placed just below and a little to the right of it. If bread and butter plates are used place at the upper-left-hand corner of the cover, with the knife laid slantingly across the upper right-hand side of the plate.
