

## "HELLO, HAWAII!"



When transpacific radiotelephone service connects the Bell system with Hawaiian telephones, next month, the transmitting station at Dixon, Calif., will use 10,000 watt, water-cooled vacuum tubes, two feet long, to throw the voice waves against the "Heaviside layer" of upper atmosphere 200 miles above the earth, from where they will "bounce" down to Hawaii. ## Will Ask State To Aid Link of Great Highway

Pedro, Harbor City, Redondo and the County of Los Angeles on the project. Members of the State Highway Commission have been invited to a luncheon meeting at Hollywood Riviera clubhouse December 15 to learn at first hand the interest being taken in the Harbor District in the highway.

Following this meeting, the state officials will be conducted over the route of the proposed improvement.

The link of the Pacific Coast highway from Seal Beach to Long Beach has been completed and is now one of the finest arteries in the state. An agreement has been reached between city officials of Long Beach, Los Angeles and the county that the next leg of the improvement through to Redondo would be done as one job in order to insure its continuity of design and proceedings.

### Cities Must Agree

Two years ago, Lomita, anticipating the early improvement of the route through that district, instituted widening proceedings and improvement by curbs and gutters for a full 100-foot width at a cost of \$192,000.

On November 11, W. Rufus Page, chairman of the local highway committee of the chamber; City Engineer Leonard, John Holm and Miss Edith Smith, representing Lomita, and Carl Hyde, executive of the local chamber, had a joint meeting with S. V. Cortelyou, state highway engineer, Supervisor John Quinn and Deputy Road Commissioner Sprouty. At this meeting, efforts were made to get the sanction of the State Divisional Engineer to the improvement of the highway in Torrance and Lomita sections. Landowners were said, at that meeting, to be agreeable to the link's widening and realignment along the Wilmington-Redondo route.

Cortelyou explained that a moral contract existed between the state commission and the local communities to complete this link of the project and that he would advise, in his report to the commission, that it be carried out if the interested cities agreed to such a section-by-section improvement.

Supervisor Quinn has taken a deep interest in the project, evidencing such interest by instructing the deputy road commissioner to place right-of-way men to work from each end of the section in order that the work of canvassing the property owners to learn their sentiments on the project may be finished as soon as possible.

Engineer Cortelyou, when informed of the dangerous condition of the road in the Torrance section, stated that he would put new, scaring equipment, recently purchased by the state, to reconditioning the highway at once.

"Sky-waves," rivaling Arabian tales, will be shot 200 miles high against the surface of an upper atmosphere known as the "heaviside layer," above the ocean between America and Hawaii, then caromed down to Honolulu—all in the flicker of an eyelash—when the human voice is carried by transpacific radiotelephone service, opening early next month.

Electric waves will be "bounced" against the upper roof of the world by a transmitting antenna of a new type, known as the horizontal Double-Y, developed during the past year. This type of antenna is designed particularly to project "sky-waves," as distinguished from "ground waves," since sky-waves are the type of short waves needed to transmit over long distances.

### Subsidiary of A. T. & T.

The transmitting station for the Hawaiian service, at Dixon, Calif., 20 miles southwest of Sacramento. The receiving station is at Point Reyes, 35 miles north of San Francisco.

Both the Dixon and Point Reyes stations have recently been completed, and equipment installed with a total investment of about \$750,000 by Transpacific Communication Co., Ltd., which will operate the new transoceanic circuit. This company is a subsidiary of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. Tests of apparatus are now being made.

The circuits set up by these stations will link the Bell System with the Mutual Telephone Co. in Hawaii. Dixon will transmit to a station at Koko Head, 12 miles from Honolulu and Point Reyes will receive from a station at Kahuku Point, 30 miles from that city. These stations in Hawaii will be operated by the Radio Corporation of America.
