Varsity Team Scores Initial Win In Season

With the Varsity entering the win column for the first time, and the Bees and Dees taking one more step toward the Marine League championship, three Tartar casaba teams beat Leuzinger by scores of 17-10, 31-11 and 9-3, respectively. The Cee game was the only one that Torrance lost, Leuzinger nosing them out by a 12-8 score. The Tartars should have won the game, but did not play up to snuff, and the result was defeat.

The Tartar Bees gave a fine exhibition of team work and as the score indicates, did plenty of scoring, with Zanon leading with 12 digits. Right on his heels was McFaggert, the other Tartar forward, with 11.

Large Leuzingers
In the Dee fray it looked as if over-confidence was going to spell defeat, but the boys snapped out of it and made a few baskets, clinching the contest. Grubbs was high-point man with six counters to his credit.

If size had counted for much, the Tartar Varsity would have been beaten by as big a score as the Trojans beat Georgia, but excellent shooting by Reeves and fine floor work by the rest of the team sewed up the game for Torrance. Practically every player on the Leuzinger Varsity is six feet tall, and they are probably the largest team in the Marine League.

Wild Flowers To Beautify Avenues Leading Into City

Most common garden tasks is cutting weeds, yet not ten per cent of those who garden know how to do it properly, at the same time lighten the job. Here's the best way:

Take a sharp hoe, and starting along one side of the plot to be cleared, cut a swath of weeds about 18 inches wide and draw the cuttings back with the hoe, leaving the space clear between the cut and uncut weeds. Then proceed back and forth along the edge of the plot, each time cutting an 18-inch swath, and continuing to leave a clean strip. This will assure the removal of all weeds—none can be missed if the clean strip is maintained.

When horses or tractors are available to plow a plot for planting wild flowers, as is the case with some community beautification projects, it will not be necessary to cut the old weeds if they are not too large. Turn the soil over to a depth of about eight or ten inches, then harrow it. The new crop of weeds can be destroyed with the harrow, too, if it is set to drag slightly, and the plot is crossed both ways.

With the weeds removed, the next step is preparing the soil for planting. On smaller plots, where all work is done by hand, the soil must either be spaded, or worked up as deep as possible with a wheel hoe. When horse-drawn implements are available, then the surface can be harrowed or disked before planting.

While soil preparation for wild flowers need not be quite as thorough as for other flowers, one will get as much out of a planting as one puts in. If the soil preparation is superficial, the results in bloom will be mediocre; if pains are taken to provide a good seed bed, the flowering will be profuse and colorful.

After the seed bed has been worked up, one should wait for a rain, then, a day or so after it has ceased, break the surface of the plot lightly, and broadcast the seeds at the rate of an ounce to every 300 square feet. A "park-way" of an ordinary city lot will require about an ounce of seed; a ten-foot strip along the front of a 50-foot lot will take an ounce and a half or two ounces. Do not attempt to sow the seed if a wind, or even a breeze is blowing. It is also a good plan to mix some well pulverized earth with seed, and scatter this evenly over the plot.

While the seed does not need to be covered, granted that a substantial rain follows planting, it is a good idea to go over the plot after it is planted, touching the surface of the soil lightly with the points of the rake. On large plots this step can be eliminated.

After bloom has been completed in the summer, wait until the plants are thoroughly dry before removing them. This is to allow the seed to mature and drop to the soil. A well handled wild flower planting will not have to be seeded over for several years.

50-50 Fire Hydrant Proposition Reported

That the mutual water company serving a portion of the McDonald tract would be willing to pay its share of installing fire hydrants on 12nd street and south of 12nd on Western avenue if the residents would also pay a just share of the cost was reported by City Engineer Leonard to the council Tuesday night in commenting on the investigation concerning lack of proper fire protection in that district.

The city would then pay to the water company a monthly rental fee of \$2 per hydrant, Leonard said. The matter is to be formally acted on by the owners of the water company in the near future and a report of such action will be given the city council.
