The motif for the 1932 edition of the orange show is colonial, commemorating the 200th anniversary of the birth of George Washington. The citrus classic is the first big exposition to observe the event in the honor of the first president of the nation.

## Home Building Revival Is Due In This State

Home building in Torrance and other California cities is due for a definite and immediate revival. This is the opinion of Joseph P. Smith, California real estate commissioner, who predicts that most of the building will be in the \$5,000 to \$5,500 price class as a result of President Hoover's recent home building conference at Washington.

"The average California home hasn't kept up with the advancing standards of automobiles, radios, electrical facilities and other equipment," said Smith.

**What Must Be Done**

"Compare it with the automobile. Old models are discarded in favor of cheaper and more efficient designs. It has been found that homes as a whole are below standard. They comprise about the largest mass of obsolete and discarded equipment in California."

Commissioner Smith believes that if new homes are to be made popular, they must be made cheaper. Better methods of financing must be found. Long term financing, say 20 years, with installment payments on principal not exceeding 4 per cent a year, with certain rights of prepayment, would make it possible for the average family to lay aside a sum for times of stress.

## Harbor District To Be Scene of Big Jobs In '32

but to present each concern's view of the future.

The telephone company gives out the brief statement of 1932's outlook: "No main projects scheduled except normal growth with construction work contingent thereto." But, it is to be remembered, "normal growth" required the telephone company to make a gross expenditure of \$187,000 in San Pedro, \$91,000 in Wilmington, \$22,000 in El Segundo, and \$23,500 in Inglewood, during the past year.

**Growth By Edison**

Additions to the Edison La Brea sub-station in Torrance included completion of installation of a 50,000 horsepower synchronous condenser and the provision therefor of a 200,000 horsepower additional service capacity. This had an important effect on the stabilization of the Edison company's service throughout a large section of the Southern California territory. Co-incident with this installation, at a cost more than \$500,000, the company doubled the capacity of the substation to further increase the availability of service over this same territory.

**Big Project to Start**

The Los Angeles Gas and Electric Corporation report: "There have been no estimates or indication given out yet as to our activities in 1932 in the Harbor District. It is very likely, however, that what is done there in 1932 will be just like that done in 1931—whatever necessary additions and facilities are required to care for increased demands for service and the maintaining of good service."

"The largest item of the 1932 schedule, which not directly affecting this section, will be the construction of an addition to our Seal Beach electric generating plant. This will entail an expenditure of about \$2,500,000, will take about 18 months to complete, and will give employment to several hundred men during the course of construction. Work is scheduled to begin sometime after the first of the year," the corporation reports.

**What P. E. Plans**

The spokesman for the P. E. declares: "Notwithstanding the fact that since 1924 its revenues have steadily decreased and it has felt most severely the economic depression, to which most utilities, as well as itself, have been subjected, it has steadily kept its property at a very high standard of maintenance, has met all demands for betterments because of community growth and civic improvement, and has maintained its service to every region in which it operates equal to every demand made upon it by traffic; and, on the whole has furnished a service both to passengers and freight in excess of the returns obtained from the traffic secured."

Within the Harbor District during 1932, inquiry has disclosed that the P. E. has outlined for its program of maintenance and betterments during the coming year an expenditure of approximately a million and one-half dollars.

"In connection with flood control and other bridge projects, about \$90,000 will be required for bridge work in the Long Beach-Seal Beach area. This year's program included in the 1932 maintenance budget, the Harbor District will be the scene of an expenditure of approximately \$27,000 covering the necessary costs to keep at peak efficiency the maintenance of way, equipment, power and conducting transportation. The total estimated sum of expenditures does not take into consideration the regular monthly roll of trawlers and other employees in the Harbor District which will add hundreds of thousands of dollars to the above amount."
