Long Beach Auto Show Feature At New Auditorium Opening

With an automobile show as the premier attraction, Long Beach will open its new \$2,000,000 municipal auditorium to public inspection the week of February 8 to 13. Promising to attract widespread notice, the auto show, the first held in Long Beach since 1929, is expected to prove a big drawing card and a successful undertaking for its sponsors, the Long Beach Motor Car Dealers Association. More than 100 of the latest automotive creations will occupy space in the show. Both the exhibition hall on the beach level and the main auditorium, with a combined floor space of 50,000 square feet will be utilized. In addition to displays of airplanes, motor boats and automotive accessories. In this imposing structure, resting like a gem in the heart of a 32-acre lagoon on the ocean front, and surrounded by a mile-long Rainbow Pier, the motor car dealers will present what is expected to be by far the most pretentious display of automobiles ever assembled under one roof in the beach city. The new auditorium provides a setting for this spectacle duplicated by no other city in the United States, perhaps in the world.
