**County Holds Seventh Place In Industry**

Los Angeles Area Contains 123 Groups of Diversified Manufacturing

Figures released through the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, classify in detail the manufacturing activities of the major industrial areas in California. The classification covers the last official census taken in 1930.

The Los Angeles area, consisting of Los Angeles County—seventh largest industrially in the country—was reported to have 4,908 manufacturing establishments, employing 114,400 wage earners receiving wages of \$175,812,298 in addition to salaried officers and employees numbering 31,467 with salaries of \$10,719,561, or grand totals of 145,867 persons engaged by manufacturing industry, receiving wages and salaries of \$286,531,859.

The total value of manufactured products of these establishments was \$1,319,344,489. The cost of fuel and purchased electric energy used by these manufacturers was \$70,324,112, leaving the value added by the manufacturing process at \$249,048,374. The last item, of course, includes the wages of labor and the salaries of officials and employees.

**Open Meeting at Scout Hall Friday Night**

**Silver Medal to be Awarded to Winner of Oratorical Contest**

All parents and the members of the Rotary club are especially invited to attend the open meeting of Troop 3, under the leadership of Scoutmaster Robert Jewellen, tomorrow night, February 26, at Scout hall on Carson street, west of the American Legion clubhouse.

Inter-patrol contests will be held with pennants awarded to the winners, and an oratorical contest on the subject, "Why I Believe in Scouting," will be the high light of the evening. Judge the contest will be W. Rufus Page, Michael Strasser and H. F. Ulbright. A silver medal will be given to the winner.

Troop 3 has more than filled its roster with a membership of 25 boys. Other troops in the city, Troop 2 under the sponsorship of the Latter Day Saints church, which meets on Tuesday evenings, and Troop 4, sponsored by the Kiwanis club, meeting on Thursday evenings, have room for more boys of a suitable age. As soon as the membership list on the latter troop is filled work will be started on the organization of a new troop to be sponsored by the American Legion. An opportunity is thus offered to a good many boys in Torrance who are interested in Scouting to line up with an outfit.

**New Policy Annuls Effect Of Tenure Law**

Six teachers in the nearby Lynwood grammar school district will not be re-employed in June as the result of a new policy adopted by the board of trustees, reports Superintendent C. F. Meyer. Unanimous sentiment against the making of any "permanent teachers" under the tenure law is given as the reason for the action. Not long ago a teacher won a judgment against the Lynwood school board covering a period of several years as the result of a dismissal which the court found was illegal.

Modification of the tenure law due to abuses which have grown up is expected at the next session of the state legislature. Several boards have come almost to the point of refusing to allow any teacher to go over the three-year probationary period, in order to avoid permanent tenure. Strong arguments are advanced both for and against the law.

**School Annual Will Be Printed In Home Shop**

This year the Torrance high school annual will be entirely a student product, according to Mrs. S. Wood, principal, who says that with the exception of cuts and photos the entire responsibility of compiling, printing and binding the school publication will rest on the shoulders of the students.

Heretofore, the annual has been printed by an outside concern. It has been an elaborate piece of work, but this year the production will be somewhat reduced in size to fit the capacity of the school print shop. Art work will be supplied by pupils of the art department. Wood cuts will be used in place of metal engravings, and the entire production will represent the head and hand work of the staff which is bringing it out.

Copies will be sold at a price below that prevailing in former years.

**Taxpayers League Asks Moratorium**

Accompanied by a petition to reduce taxes by 30 per cent, a request, formulated by the San Pedro Taxpayers League, has been filed with the Los Angeles city council seeking relief for property owners under assessment for public improvements.

The request proposes that the city council voice by appropriate resolution an appeal to the holders of public improvement bonds to refrain from foreclosure proceedings for one year, so that property owners may not be dispossessed of their property at a time when they are unable to protect themselves by payment of accrued assessments, penalties, or court costs. The petition and request were referred to the city attorney and finance committee.

**Man Jailed On Battery Charge**

Romer Blum, 2117 Cabrillo avenue, appeared in police court Friday, February 19, to answer to a charge of battery preferred by his wife. Blum was given a fine of \$100 or 35 days in the county jail, which was suspended, and an additional sentence of two days in the Torrance city jail which he served.
