

Entire Week of Entertainment At Dedication of Auditorium

The meet was run off without accidents, although Jenks and Al Hastings gave the spectators a thrill when the wings of their gliders bumped in midair.


The fifth contest of the series will be held at the same field on Sunday, March 27. Practice flights are made almost daily at the location.

ticularly among distributors in our industry.

"We believe there is more of a tendency to stabilize prices here and in the south.

Prospects Good
 "The prospects for continued operation of the tin mill at the same rate as in recent months is good. The three-day schedule this week is only temporary."

"De Forest said the output of the Columbia company's entire Pittsburgh plant was about 40 per cent of capacity, the tin mill production having tended to offset the slower departments.

"Generally speaking," he declared, "the industry is beginning to believe that more normal operations are in prospect."

"De Forest's views were upheld by the current analysis of the magazine 'Steel,' which found considerable improvement because of the stabilization of heavy finished steel prices.

Price Concessions
 "The present objective of the industry, according to the magazine, was more the elimination of destructive price concessions rather than an advance in prices.

"On bars, plates and shapes," Steel said, "producers are withdrawing all quotations under 1.60 cents Pittsburgh or equivalent and will book through the second quarter on this basis.

"This quotation is an advance of \$2 per ton over the recent general market."

"Operations of the industry as a whole declined to 25 per cent of capacity, a drop of two per cent, Ford was said to be entering the market with great deliberateness.

Broader Purchases
 "Generally speaking, Ford purchases are slightly broader," the review said, "but they are so diffused to isolated parts makers that the market has derived little impetus from this source."

Complete, Colorful Kitchen Arrives For Three-Day Cooking School

Bright, Cheerful Surroundings Essential to Acquire "Spirit of the Kitchen", Says Miss B. Edna Galvin

A complete kitchen that can be carried around in a trunk arrived in Torrance today. It is the property of Miss B. Edna Galvin, Home Economist, who will conduct the Torrance Herald-Safeway Stores cooking school which opens at Torrance Woman's Clubhouse on March 2 and continues the afternoons of March 3 and 4.

This kitchen, an exact duplicate of the Safeway Homemakers' Bureau test-kitchen except for the mechanical refrigerator, range and large pieces of furniture, contains all the equipment necessary for the correct preparation of any recipe.

Homemakers attending the three-day cooking school will notice that the kitchen equipment is colorful. Success in cooking depends upon the spirit of the kitchen, declares Miss Galvin. Women cook better and enjoy household tasks if they work in cheerful surroundings and so strongly do Mrs. Julia Lee Wright, national director of the Safeway Homemakers' Bureau, and her assistants believe this that the Bureau's test kitchen is carried out in cheery red and cream.

The first equipment ordered for the test kitchen was a red tea kettle, acquired only after a long and diligent search. To go with this bright kettle are creamy walls, built-in fixtures of leaf green and bright checked curtains in which red predominates.

With the kitchen set up at the Woman's Clubhouse, Miss Galvin will complete preparations for the school tomorrow when she goes shopping for supplies at a nearby Safeway store. She will select personally, all of the fruits, vegetables, dairy products, canned foodstuffs and meats, with the assistance of the hometown Safeway man.

All recipes which will be demonstrated at the school have been tested personally by Mrs. Julia Lee Wright and her staff of top assistants and are made of everyday, reasonable foodstuffs which may be selected in Torrance.
