"Unreality" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon on Sunday, April 3, in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.

The Golden Text is from Psalm cxix: "For ever, O Lord, thy word is settled in heaven. . . . Through thy precepts I get understanding; therefore I hate every false way."

One of the Bible citations in the Lesson-Sermon includes words of the Elliphaz from The Book of Job: "I would seek unto God, and unto God would I commit my cause; which doeth great things and unsearchable; marvellous things without number. . . . to set up on high those that be low; that those which mourn may be exalted to safety. He disappointeth the devices of the crafty, so that their hands cannot perform their enterprise. . . . He shall deliver thee in six troubles: yea, in seven there shall no evil touch thee."

A selection from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, states: "As God Himself is good and is Spirit, goodness and spirituality must be immortal. . . . If goodness and spirituality are real, evil and materiality are unreal and cannot be the outcome of an infinite God, good."

Among the many advantages that will accrue to Torrance residents by the adoption of the City Charter are: . . .

- ## Work For Torrance Men:
1. Taking care of school grounds and repairing school buildings. This work is now done by Los Angeles crews.
 2. Transporting children to schools. Last year the Los Angeles Board of Education paid out \$16,000.00 of YOUR TAX MONEY to OUT-OF-TOWN bus drivers to carry Torrance children to school. This work should be done by Torrance residents.

Save Taxpayers Money:

Last year Torrance taxpayers paid \$111,616.48 MORE in School Taxes than it cost the Los Angeles Board of Education to maintain and operate Torrance schools. Under the charter, the Torrance School Tax Rate can be REDUCED AT LEAST 38c, which is MORE THAN HALF THE ENTIRE MUNICIPAL TAX RATE. Each year we are donating MORE than the cost of a new 12-unit school and yet the Los Angeles board refuses to build one on the Fern avenue site.

Separate Schools and Classes For Mexicans, Etc.:

Under a local school board as provided by the Charter, your children will not be held back in their education by association with Mexicans and other less alert pupils.

School Teachers Will Live In Torrance:

At present about half our school teachers live elsewhere. Naturally they have little interest in local affairs or the development of Torrance. There is also the tendency to "rush off" as soon as school is out. This lessens the interest in their work and tends to prevent them from staying after school hours to help backward pupils.

Protection Against Confiscatory Assessments:

The charter contains rigid limitations on all Special Assessments which place unwise burdens against property.

Discourages Further Annexations:

Further annexations threaten to prove VERY COSTLY to Torrance property owners, and might even mean the passing of control of municipal affairs to the hands of outsiders. Certain provisions in the charter discourage further annexations and affords protection against amalgamation with Los Angeles.

Makes Torrance Independent:

The charter gives Torrance absolute control of municipal affairs. In a word, the charter has retained all the good features of the State Law governing Sixth Class cities and eliminated the objectionable ones.

Most of the Industries and Large Property Owners in Torrance have endorsed the charter. Many of its most enlightened citizens are heartily in favor of it.

Don't be influenced by the opinions of individuals or groups with private "axes to grind." Get a copy of the charter from the City Clerk and read it. You will readily appreciate its many advantages.
