Grocery Chain Sales For March Drop 15 Per Cent

Sales of The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company for the five week period ending April 2nd were \$88,912.192. This compares with \$104,742,250 for the same period in 1931, and is a decrease of \$15,830,058, or 15.11%.

March sales, expressed in tons, were estimated at 529,193 this year, compared with 552,825 in March 1931. This is a decrease in quantity of merchandise sold of \$2,827 tons, or 5.09%.

Average weekly sales in March were \$17,782,438, compared with \$20,948,450 in 1931, a decrease of \$3,166,012. Average weekly tonnage sales were 104,040, compared with 110,565 in March 1931, a decrease of 6255 tons.
