Interscholastic Field Meet Held In Los Angeles

No other division of athletics is of such genuine importance to youth in developing courage, confidence and fairness, than track and field events, so principals of 145 high schools in Southern California are issuing special invitations to the public to attend the final meets of the California Interscholastic Federation, which will be held Saturday, May 14.

The meets on Saturday, May 7, took place at five points in Southern California: In Los Angeles at Housh Field on the Los Angeles high school grounds, with 34 city high schools competing; in San Diego, with Imperial Valley schools participating; in Redlands, Santa Barbara and South Gate, with schools from these districts entering their stars.

Winners in these events will be entered in the final Southern Section meet to be held on Saturday, May 14th, at Housh Field, on the grounds of the Los Angeles high school.

This event is expected to draw a record-breaking crowd of sports followers, for they will witness an exhibition of skill and achievement on the part of youth, which Seth F. Van Patten, athletic commissioner for the California Interscholastic Federation says will be the greatest aggregation of high school students in the history of California academic track and field meets. Not only will the number of entries be larger than ever, for there will be more than 500 boys participating in the three classes, A, B and C, but there is every indication that many records in track and field contests will be shattered.

"The final meet for the Southern Section in Los Angeles on May 14th is destined to be the best in the history of the California Interscholastic Federation, and we are particularly anxious that parents whose children are attending any school come and see the results of athletic training and competition as developed under the direction and control of the federation.

"Track and field sports give every boy a chance to participate in athletics and under the federation plan, boys participating are given an opportunity to develop the highest qualities which are necessary for success in athletics as well as business," Van Patten said.

Pacific Coast to Enjoy Heavy Tourist Travel

Railroad Official Foresees Exceptional Western Travel During Season

As the scene of many national and international events this spring and summer, the Pacific Coast will play host to thousands of visitors from all parts of the world, it was confidently predicted today by transportation officials.

Starting with the annual meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce in San Francisco this month, the list of outstanding attractions will include the Shrine convention in the same city, the Olympic Games at Los Angeles and the American Legion convention in Portland.

Plans for the expeditions handling of the tourist traffic, at the lowest transportation costs in many years, have been completed by the Southern Pacific Company, according to E. W. Clapp, general passenger traffic manager for the railroad. Annual summer round-trip excursion fares will become effective, eastbound, May 22, and westbound on May 15.

This year, for the first time, the eastern railroads will join with the western roads in slashing fares for the summer season, greatly reducing travel costs between the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, Clapp pointed out.

The coming season will also be the first in which the added fare for travel to and from California points through the Pacific Northwest has been eliminated, or greatly reduced—a feature that is expected to play an important part in attracting a heavy volume of vacation travel to the West, it was declared.
