Contract Soon to Be Awarded On New School

Resolution Asking Employment of Local Labor "Acknowledged"

In a letter signed by H. E. Griffin, assistant secretary of the Los Angeles city board of education, acknowledgment was made of the receipt of a resolution from the Torrance city council asking that local labor be employed so far as possible in the construction of the proposed new Fern avenue school.

The letter stated, "Your communication has been presented to the board of education and has been referred to the building committee and the business manager." In a recent issue of the Journal of Commerce, George Mitty of Los Angeles was named as having presented the lowest bid, but as yet no official action has been taken by the board to the contract. Bids are being asked separately on the construction of the building, the plumbing, wiring, etc., instead of for the entire job.

Owners Protest the Widening of Hawthorne Blvd.

Petition of Hawthorne boulevard property owners that no further widening of Hawthorne boulevard be carried forward at this time, today was being studied by Supervisor John R. Quinn and the road committee of the board of supervisors. The petitioners, who reside in the Lennox community, pointed out that recently Hawthorne boulevard was widened to a width of 71 feet on either side of the Los Angeles Railway right-of-way, and was widened in places to 130 feet.

"We do not accept the present setback of 71 feet from the street railway right-of-way as proposed by the Regional Planning Commission," the resolution forwarded to the supervisors stated. The letter was signed by J. B. Vaughn, A. F. Gear, Orb Mabey and M. E. Fraser, secretary.

Liquor Detail Causes Arrest of Lomita Resident

William Burns, 1750 Eshelman, Lomita, was arrested by a liquor detail headed by G. A. Morford, on charges of violation of the Wright act, including possession and sale of liquor. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 or 25 days in the county jail on the possession charge, which was suspended for six months, and \$150 or 75 days on the charge of selling liquor, half of which was suspended and the balance paid.

City Councilman Speaks at Civic League Meeting

At a meeting of the Waleria Civic League, held at the Waleria school building Friday night, business was transacted relating to the proposed reduction of water rates in the district. A petition, signed by almost every water consumer in the district, had been prepared and will be forwarded in a few days to the state railroad commission.

Councilman G. A. R. Steiner, who attended the meeting, made a few explanatory remarks regarding the street work in Waleria. In contrast to the complaints of neglect on the part of local residents, Councilman Steiner, who is chairman of the committee on streets, pointed out that in the past year the city of Torrance had spent on road betterment in Waleria more than \$100,000 and above the total amount of taxes paid into the city treasury from that district. In addition to this the district is provided with lighting, fire and police protection, so that apparently it is receiving what it is entitled to in the way of civic benefits.

Clean Lots Now, Prevent Damage From Grass Fire

LOMITA.—Captain Frank Laski of the county fire department has sent out notices to all property owners whose addresses are known to clean up their vacant lots immediately as a fire prevention measure. All lots which are now overgrown with dry weeds and grass constitute a fire menace and as such must be taken care of under the law which requires the lots to be cleaned and the debris disposed of in a way to remove the danger.

Captain Laski announces that his department is ready to cooperate with the property owner in issuing permits for bonfires when the lots are cleaned and the debris placed in piles. Former Employee of Union Tool Company Dies. William C. Troost, age 56, passed away Friday at Hondo after a lingering illness of some months' duration. Mr. Troost was well known among the employees of the Union Tool Company, now National Supply, where he had worked as a machinist for a number of years until sickness compelled him about seven months ago to give up his post.

Interest Revives In Lomita Branch Sepulveda Blvd.

LOMITA.—Interest in the proposed extension of Sepulveda boulevard through Lomita, following Lomita boulevard was revived Tuesday when a large delegation from Lomita attended a meeting held at the county road department in Los Angeles to discuss the possibility of putting through the improvement as a cash job. Property owners along the route have expressed their willingness to deed sufficient land for the widening of the highway, with the plan to have it completed as a cash job by the county out of gas tax funds. The road will leave the section passing through Torrance near the Redondo Beach city limits and connect with Lomita boulevard passing through the center of Lomita. It will enter Long Beach over the State street bridge.

Long Beach Man Gets Jail Sentence

Terrill Kightlinger, 1421 Orange avenue, Long Beach, was given a sentence of ten days in jail following an altercation which took place at a down town apartment house Sunday. Kightlinger came from Long Beach to see his wife, who was staying at the apartment house, and an argument followed which resulted in Kightlinger's arrest on a charge of assault and battery.

Taylor Trial Set For June

A. J. Taylor, now being held in the county jail awaiting action on other charges, will go on trial in the justice court here on June 6 on a complaint preferred by T. A. Venable of Waleria. The complaint alleges the obtaining on false pretenses property amounting in value to about \$350, consisting of 127 bales of barley hay. The property was secured on or about October 21, last year.

Woman Arrested On Liquor Charge

Blancha Elliott, residing at 1604 Juniper street, was arrested May 20 by the members of the dry squad when a raid on her premises disclosed the presence of 17 full and one partly full pint bottles of liquor. Search warrants had been issued and acting on a tip from an undisclosed source the officers traced a complicated system of wiring which lead to the cache behind a chest of drawers. Mrs. Elliott pleaded guilty to the charge when arraigned in the local justice court and was fined \$300 or 150 days in the county jail. In default of payment, she was remanded to jail.
