These words of the Psalmist constitute the Golden Text in the Lesson-Sermon on the question "Is the Universe, including Man, Evolved by Atomic Force?" on Sunday, June 19, in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.
One of the Bible selections from Isaiah states: "I am the Lord, and there is none else, there is none God beside me: I girded thee, though thou hast not known me; that they may know from the rising of the sun, and from the west, that there is none beside me. I am the Lord, and there is none else. . . . Remember the former things of old: for I am God, and there is none else; I am God, and there is none like me, declaring the end from the beginning, and from ancient times the things that are not yet done, saying, My counsel shall stand, and I will do all my pleasure."
A passage from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, says: "The true theory of the universe, including man, is not in material history but in spiritual development. Inspired thought relinquishes a material, sensual, and mortal theory of the universe, and adopts the spiritual and immortal."

Steady Progress Christian Science Movement Reported

BOSTON, Mass., June 6.—The steady progress of the Christian Science movement during a year marked by a general slowing down in human activities was emphasized here today in reports presented at the Annual Meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, Members from many parts of the world—more than 6000 in all—listened to reports of the various departments of the organization, which told of steady attainment in its numerous activities.
Announcement was made of the election of the following officers: President—Hon. Ralph O. Brewster of Dexter, Maine.
Clerk—Ezra W. Palmer of Brookline, Mass.
Treasurer—Edward L. Ripley of Brookline, Mass.
First Reader—Gordon V. Comer of Denver, Colo.
Second Reader—Miss Lucia C. Coulson of London, Eng.
Thirty-eight Christian Science Societies have qualified for the title of Church, and 52 branch church organizations have been added. During the year the first branches of The Mother Church were recognized in Greece, Belgium and Czechoslovakia. The Mother Church now has 2522 branch churches and societies; also 42 college or university organizations formed and conducted in accordance with the Manual of The Mother Church.
