

**Amaranth Ave.  
 Paving Complete,  
 Open to Traffic**

Paving on Amaranth avenue has been completed by the contractors and today workmen are engaged in laying rock and oil shoulders on either side of the cement concrete, as on Vermont avenue. According to E. A. Burt, county road construction superintendent, heavy traffic is expected over both Vermont and Amaranth avenues during the Olympic Games events in Long Beach, the two arteries being a convenient route between Olympic village and the eastern part of Los Angeles and Long Beach, where the rowing races are to be held. Long Beach last week dedicated its new marine stadium in elaborate ceremonies at which many notables were present. Traffic over the newly-completed link in Vermont avenue is becoming heavier constantly, it is reported, as this was opened last July 3, for the double week-end holiday. With completion of the oil and rock shoulders, which amounts to widening of the highway another five feet on either side, motorists soon will be able to make full use of the two arteries. The new improvement brings both Vermont and Amaranth to a junction just north of Anaheim road. Completion date on the improvement, which is being done by the county on a cash contract, is August 10.

**Property Owners  
 In Alondra Dist.  
 Appeal to Board**

Plans for a meeting between a committee of property owners in Alondra and the county board of supervisors' committee on acquisition and improvement district bond relief are being completed this week by the local group headed by O. B. McDowell and John Salm. Approximately a dozen property owners in the district appeared before the county board of supervisors last Monday and presented an urgent appeal for immediate relief from the rapidly mounting taxes in the district. Supervisor John R. Quinn is hopeful that some plan of state aid may be worked out for the Alondra Park assessment district, which is one of the two applications made of the Mattoon Act for park acquisition in the county. Admittedly it is a different problem than in the average A and F district, where interest payments are falling behind.

Property owners in the B zone are falling heir to a greater burden than those in the A zone of the assessment district, which is nearer the park. Mr. McDowell pointed out to the supervisors Monday afternoon. "We have had some of our best legal talent at work on a plan for the relief of delinquent assessment districts for the past year," Supervisor Quinn told the group after Mr. Salm had lead their case before the board. "Either we must have relief or it means confiscation of our property," the supervisors were told. It is the added burden of the assessment for the 300-acre park on top of four or five other large assessments that is making it unbearable, it was pointed out. The improvement districts are Rosecrans avenue, Electric, Prairie avenue and A. and I. No. 123. The park district is No. 28.

**Ranch a Day  
 Is Record of  
 Land Company**

**Increased Business in Sales  
 Department Reported by  
 Bank Branch**
